with the somewhat decadent avuncular type, Arthur Norris. The second book, *Goodbye to Berlin*, is where we met the wonderfully unique Sally Bowles. Both books are full of wit and humour, but the works are also an obituary for a Berlin that was rapidly changing. It's this subtle move from a communist leftleaning city to a more extreme right wing one that leaves a nasty taste in your mouth especially the way some characters seem to capitulate without a second thought. Inspiration for the classic movie *Cabaret*, this wonderful read leaves you mourning for a time that can never be regained. *Greg*

an interesting choice, raw and quite bleak in places, but showing an author with a great deal of promise. Set in Tasmania in the 1830s, it concerns John Batman (yes, the eventual founder of Melbourne) and his role in the so-called Black Wars. It certainly doesn't paint him as a sympathetic man, as he leads a ragtag bunch of convicts hoping for their ticket-of-leave if they succeed in bringing in (or otherwise destroying) the remnants of the region's indigenous population. Accompanying them are two Aborigines from Parramatta and Black Bill, brought up by a white family, who has undeclared reasons for hunting down the local headman. A nightmarish journey into the harsh country ensues. An uncompromising depiction of a period of colonial history that most would prefer to forget. Lindy 296pp Pb \$27.99

ere's a nice picture of Peter Milne and myself taken at the dinner when we acknowledged Peter's forty years working at Abbey's. Peter formally retired last month. He has been a huge asset for Abbey's over the years. We could not have done what we have without him. I'm sure he will still contribute to the Crime Chronicle or Abbey's Advocate on occasion.

Not only because Peter has retired, but also because business conditions in the book trade are quite tough, you will find many changes at Abbey's in the coming months. I think I will retire (yet again) any time soon. I'll be eighty in September and I'm suffering from future shock, so I guess it is time. Meanwhile my son Alan Abbey, with Adrian Hardingham as General Manager and David Hall as Shop Manager, are working hard with all our other staff to keep up the standards at Abbey's. Jacqui Rychner, our longtime devoted Manager of Language Book Centre, is also approaching retirement and has scaled back her working hours. As Manager she has been replaced by Melanie Macri, a very experienced bookseller trained in Germany.

Ann Leahy, once Manager of Abbey's, who has been doing a great job working from home as the editor and designer of Abbey's Advocate for more than ten years, has also moved on to other things. We now have Craig Kirchner, who will take care of all our newsletters while working in the office as Marketing Manager. Craig has a background in advertising and design, so we can expect some changes in the coming months.

Meanwhile we have moved Galaxy Bookshop, which was a few doors away from us in York Street, to the first floor here together with Language Book Centre. We moved our office, which used to be on the first floor, to some cheaper space on the fifth floor Phone numbers and web addresses remain the same. Red Eye Records is moving in where Galaxy was, and we know they will make a congenial neighbour for us and for you.

I really enjoyed the latest book from the ever-dependable David Lodge. It is called A Man of Parts (\$27.95 Pb 559pp) and is a fictional biography of the famous writer H G Wells. Lodge says on the opening page that everything that happens is based on factual sources, so this 'novel' is in fact a page-turning, eye-popping biography of the man who invented the future, as they say. How's this for a quote from H G? "I imagined an international Encyclopaedia Organisation that would store and continuously update every item of verifiable human knowledge on microfilm and make it universally accessible - a world wide web of information. I wrote a book about it called World Brain, but it didn't catch on. (Hullo Wikipedia!) His ideas about Free Love and sex were not always acceptable, but he certainly lived his own life that way. Some of his longer loves included Elizabeth Von Arnim, Amber Reeves and Rebecca West, all of whom were approved by his indispensable wife (and typist!) Jane. I remember avidly reading his Outline of World History, when I was stuck in Spain, some time in the sixties, with three children under five, where the only reading matter in English was The Times newspaper, which arrived on the bus from Barcelona each afternoon at three.

H G Wells' novels, essays and journalism were hugely popular and made him a rich man. His output was enormous. Some of his books are classics but he also wrote a lot of pot-boilers, so by the end of his life, just as the Second World War ended, he was almost a forgotten man. He is regarded as the Founding Father of Science Fiction, so you might like to listen to the CD edition of The Time Machine (\$29.95) or we have The Time Machine /The Invisible Man / The War of the Worlds in an Everyman Classic edition \$43.95 Hb 418pp).

Because Edith Nesbit and her family entourage were boon companions, until Wells seduced their daughter (or she seduced him) I was often reminded of A S Byatt's novel The Children's Book (\$24.95 Pb 883pp), which drew on the life of the famous Edwardian writer of children's stories. Lots about the Fabian Society also. Even if you think you know a lot about H G Wells, you'll find this interesting and amusing as well.

David Lodge's earlier book was another fictional biography, this time about Henry James called Author Author (\$24.95 Pb 389pp). I think these are a great idea. They will reach many more readers than an academic biography.

He also wrote **The Year of Henry James** (\$26.95 Pb 352pp), which describes how he set about the novel and his dismay when he discovered two other authors were also writing about Henry James at the same time. Both funny and serious. Remember



Peter's 40 years with Abbey's

Lodge's very amusing stories about academic literary life and international conventions? There is an omnibus edition containing Changing Places / Small World / Nice Work called The Campus Trilogy due out in Vintage Classics very soon, so that will only be \$12.95. Great value. Lodge himself was a literary academic, so I guess his recent books, about Henry James and H G Wells, are making use of his stored knowledge and expertise.

Of course I had to read the latest crime novel from Donna Leon. This is **Drawing Conclusions** (\$29.95 Pb 260pp), which is number 20 in the series. It will appeal most to readers already familiar with Commissario Brunetti, his family and colleagues. As usual there's no violence and no danger, in fact barely a crime, but Brunetti's intuition tells him that the old lady did not die from a heart attack only, and he is allowed to indulge in a great deal of introspection. As always Venice is the star of the story.

The Sydney Film Festival is on in June, so it is a good time to remind you of our Film Studies section. Conversations with Scorsese by Richard Schickel (\$44.95 Hb 448pp) is in effect a history of modern Hollywood. You can read about the earlier period of Hollywood in the fascinating biography Empire of Dreams: The Epic Life of Cecil B DeMille by Scott Eyman (\$52.95 Hb 592pp). Buzz: The Life and Art of Busby Berkeley by Jeffrey Spivak (Hb \$65 408pp) will bring back memories of gorgeous girls dancing or swimming in fantastic geometric patterns. Not only lovely to look at, but very funny as well. It contains the never-before-published memoir by Buzz himself. For the serious buff, look at Cinema Today: A Conversation with Thirty-nine Filmmakers from Around the World by Elena Oumana (\$39.95 Pb 296pp) who has presented the results from her interviews in an accessible format grouped under key topics rather than separate interviews with each film-maker.

Great news that Philip Roth has won the Man Booker International Prize, given every two years for a body of work, rather than for a single novel. I checked our website and found Abbey's had twelve titles in stock including the Cambridge Companion to Philip Roth edited by Timothy Parrish (\$49.95 Pb 196pp) and also, just in this year, another title in literary criticism Philip Roth: American Pastoral, The Human Stain, The Plot Against America edited by Debra Shostak (\$39.95 Pb). Notice, while you're in the section that we always carry all of the titles in the Cambridge Companion series. The fiction titles are Nemesis (\$35), Operation Shylock: A Confession (\$27.95 Pb), Sabbath's Theatre (\$12.95), The Dying Animal (\$22.95), The Humbling, Everyman, Portnoy's Complaint, The Plot Against America, Patrimony: A True Story and Indignation (\$24.95 each). Two of these are Vintage Classics, so very good value. It's time to read some of these again, or for the first time if you're younger than me!

Abbey's was in the Queen Victoria Building when Portnoy's **Complaint** first came out in 1969. I remember being very flustered when a detective came in and asked to see the copies we had under the counter! Believe it or not - he was wearing a hat and a belted raincoat!
