Roberto Bolaño Pb \$24.99

Bolaño (**The Savage Detectives** Pb \$24.99) has four academics united in their love for an elusive German author. Their obsession brings them to the Mexican town of St Teresa, where hundreds of women have disappeared. Originally intended as five separate books, the decision to create



one epic novel was certainly the right one. This can be a brutal read at times, but once you delve into its mysteries, it is almost impossible to come up for air. For me, this is far and away the novel of the year. *Greg*

The Museum of Innocence Orhan Pamuk Tp \$35

This novel from the *Nobel Prize*-winner is set in Istanbul from 1975 to the present. Kemal, scion of one of the city's wealthiest families, has an obsessive love for the beautiful, but poor, Fusun. Exploring the difficulty of being caught between traditional and Westernised ways, this epic and richly drawn novel is a panoramic examination of life in modern Turkey.

The Disappeared Kim Echlin Pb \$29.99

When Anne is 16, she meets the love of her life – Serey, an older Cambodian studying in Montreal. It is 1979 and he can't go home. When the borders reopen, he sets off to discover what happened to his family. Then 11 years later, having never heard a word from him, Anne sees him on-screen and goes to Phnom Penh to find him. A beautiful, spare and elegant novel. *Lindy*

Gentleman Captain J D Davies Tp \$34.95

Charles II has been newly restored to the throne, but he still has opponents. He commands Matthew Quinton, whose family has been loyal to the monarchy, to sail a ship to western Scotland to intercept a cargo of weapons destined for the king's enemies. Quinton is inexperienced, but determined to overcome the perils of the sea, as well as those

onboard. Strongly plotted and written by a maritime historian, this introduces a character destined for bigger things!

The Umbrella Club David Brooks Tp \$32.95

A friendship is forged on the WWI battlefields of France between Axel and Edward, two young Englishmen. Inspired by barrage balloons, they develop a mutual fascination that changes the course of their lives. This is a darkly compelling adventure into the depths of the human soul and to the frontiers of colonial exploration. From the author of the *Miles Franklin* shortlisted **The Fern Tattoo** (Tp \$32.95).











The Lacuna Barbara Kingsolver Tp \$35

Prepare to be utterly beguiled by this gloriously vivid novel! Harrison Shepherd's Mexican mother

Salome finds him a liability in her search for rich protectors. Learning a talent for fading into the background, he is an acute observer of life around him. By chance, he becomes involved with Diego Rivera, Frida Kahlo and Leon Trotsky, then he flees north to the US, where he re-makes himself as a novelist - and becomes caught up in post-war anticommunism. Distinctive and dazzling! From the author of The Poisonwood Bible (Pb \$23,95). Lindv

Inherent Vice

Thomas Pynchon Tp \$32.95

When Larry 'Doc' Sportello's ex-girlfriend turns up at his house concerned for the safety of her boyfriend, Doc can't help but get involved. So begins his rapid

descent into a world of lies and corruption. Set in the early 1970s as LA awaits the Manson trial, this is a town both paranoid and hung-over. Extremely funny and fast-paced, there is also a more sombre tone, lamenting the missed opportunities of the 60s and what that period promised, but could never fulfil. Greg

The Search

Maureen Myant Tp \$34.99

Czechoslovakia, 1942. Jan's father has been summarily executed by the Nazis. His mother and older sister Maria have disappeared and his younger sister Lena has

been removed to a remote farm in the German countryside. With Europe in the throes of war, the 10-year-old boy embarks on a personal journey to reunite his family. An exploration of fear and loss, and of the bond between parents and children.

Legacy Larissa Behrendt Pb \$24.95

Simone Harlowe is young and clever, an Aboriginal lawyer straddling two lives and two cultures, while studying at Harvard. Her family life back in Sydney

is defined by the complex relationship she has with her father Tony, a prominent Aboriginal rights activist. As she juggles the challenges of a modern woman's life – career, family, friends and relationships – her father confronts his own uncomfortable truths as his secret double life implodes. From the author of Home (Pb \$24.95).

The World Beneath

Cate Kennedy Tp \$32.95

Rich and Sandy, once environmental activists. have both settled into the uncomfortable compromises of middle age. All they have

in common is their 15-year-old daughter Sophie. The parent's uneasy truce is shattered when Rich and Sophie take a trek through the Tasmanian wilderness and leave the track to explore the remote terrain known as the Labyrinth.

Lovesong

Alex Miller Hb 39.99

Seeking shelter from a rainstorm in a Parisian cafe. John meets the exotic Sabiha and his carefully-mapped life

changes forever. Years later, living a quiet life in Melbourne, what happened in Paris seems like a distant, troubling dream. John confides the story behind their seemingly ordinary lives to an ageing, melancholy writer. Secret stories and a nice twist from the author of **Conditions of Faith** and Landscape of Farewell (both \$23.95).



Manituana Wu Mina Hb \$45

It is 1775 and war erupts between the British Empire and the American colonies. Rebels and lovalists to the British compete for an alliance



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with the Six Nations of the Iroquois. To save his threatened world, a Mohawk war chief sets off with a group of warriors on a journey that takes him to the salons of Georgian London, knowing that the road back will be paved with war. "Fast-paced and richly detailed, this throbs with violence, heroism, betrayal and sex." - Time magazine

Parrot and Olivier in America

Peter Carey Hb \$49.95

Olivier is a young aristocrat, one of an endangered species born in France just after the Revolution. Parrot, the son of an itinerant English printer, wanted to be an artist, but has ended up in middle



age as a servant. When Olivier sets sail for the New World, Parrot is sent with him as spy, protector, foe and foil. A dazzlingly inventive re-imagining of de Tocqueville's famous journey, Carey's latest evokes the Old World colliding with the New.

Man Booker Award 2009

Tp \$32.99

Set in 16th century

England, the cast includes familiar historical figures, such as Henry VIII and Thomas Cromwell, yet it is all accomplished in a readable, modern tone. Written over five years, this is a very worthy winner.

Rebels and Traitors

Lindsey Davis Tp \$32.95

Set against the terrible struggle of the English Civil War and the dark plots of the Commonwealth, this is a story of soldiers, adventurers, aristocrats and kings, tradesmen, politicians, radicals and

scavengers – and the hopes and dreams that carried them through this turbulent era. After spending time in ancient Rome with the Inspector Falco series, this novel marks the author's return to her first love, the English Civil War. A masterpiece of historical fiction!

The Infinities

John Banville Tp \$32.99

A warm, compelling and idiosyncratic novel from a great writer. Banville's descriptive powers are so funny and accurate that you view familiar things

in a new way. The Godley family await the death of the patriarch, a renowned mathematician, in their crumbling mansion. As he lies in a coma, his dysfunctional family (so odd and interesting!) try to resolve their problems. With the arrival of the languid Roddy and the enigmatic Bunny Grace, tensions rise. As this very human drama unfolds, the Gods watch from above (as does Rex, the arthritic dog, from below). Compulsively readable. From the author of **The Untouchable** and **The Sea** (\$22.95 each). *Peter S*

Too Much Happiness Alice Munro

Alice Munro Hb \$49.95

Brilliantly paced and lit with sparks of danger and underlying menace, these are dazzling, provocative stories about Svengali men and the



radical women who outmanoeuvre them, about destructive marriages and curdled friendships, about mothers and sons, about moments that change or haunt a life. Winner of the 2009 *Man Booker International Prize*, Munro (**The View from Castle Rock** Pb \$24.95) takes us through complex and harrowing emotions in stories that surprise and amaze.

Told through the different voices of Tess, her siblings and her parents, this enthralling story is full of vivid characters, with a wonderfully drawn historical flavour of those desperate times. *Lindy*

The Wild Things Dave Eggers Hb \$35

Seven-year-old Max likes to make noise, get dirty, ride his bike without a helmet and howl like a wolf. Driven by a series of pressures, both internal

and external, he leaves home, jumps in a boat and sails across the ocean to a strange island where giant beasts reign. Based on the film script he co-wrote with Spike Jonze, and encouraged and endorsed by Maurice Sendak, Eggers (A Heartbreaking Work of Staggering Genius Pb \$22.95, What is the What Pb \$26.95) has reimagined the classic Where the Wild Things Are (Pb \$19.95, Hb \$34.95) as a novel, delving into the chaos of youth, while Max explores the chaos of the world around him. Let the wild rumpus start!

The Year of the Flood

Margaret Atwood

Set in the not-too-distant future, this is a counterpart to **Oryx and Crake** (Pb \$24.99), which you don't have to have read to appreciate this. Adam One, leader of a green sect, has long forecast a waterless

flood that will purge the earth of mankind. When it happens, who survives? Told from the perspectives of Toby, holed up in a health spa, and Ren, medically isolated in the brothel where she worked, and travelling back and forth in time, this engrossing story is both a warning and a treat to read! *Lindy*

The Gourmet

Muriel Barbery Hb \$27.95

Pierre Arthens – France's greatest food critic – is on his deathbed, trying to recall one sublime memory, a taste from the past. The story alternates between



his recollections of different times and meals, and the reactions and impressions of the people he leaves behind – unflattering, indifferent, conflicted, deeply upset – which add up to a well fleshed out portrait of a man whose genius was spent on ideas, rather than people. If you enjoyed Barbery's **The Elegance of the Hedgehog** (Pb \$24.95), you'll love this! *Lindy*

Summertime

J M Coetzee Hb \$39.95

A young English biographer is working on a book about the late writer, John Coetzee. He plans to focus on the years from 1972 to 1977 when Coetzee, in his 30s, shared a run-down cottage with

his widowed father in the suburbs of Cape Town. This, the biographer senses, is the period when he was finding his feet as a writer. Sometimes heartbreaking, often very funny, this new work shows us a great writer at the height of his powers. It completes the trilogy of fictionalised memoir begun with **Boyhood** and **Youth** (Pb \$24.95 each). From the author of **Disgrace** and **The Life and Times of Michael K** (\$24.95 each) and **Diary of a Bad Year** (\$23.95).

A Week in December

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Sebastian Faulks Tp \$32.95

This new novel from Faulks takes place in London over the course of a single week at the end of 2007. It brings together a

cast of characters whose lives apparently run on parallel lines, but – as gradually becomes clear – are intricately related. Reading like a thriller, this is a social satire that pulls together powerful ideas about family, money, religion and the way we live now. From the author of **Birdsong**, **Charlotte Gray**, **Engleby** and the recent James Bond novel **Devil May Care** (Pb \$24.95 each).







Lustrum Robert Harris Tp \$32.95

Following on from Imperium (Pb \$21.95), the year is 63 BC and Rome is on the brink of acquiring a vast empire, with seven

men struggling for power. Cicero is consul, Caesar his ruthless young rival, Pompey the republic's greatest general, Crassus its richest man, Cato a political fanatic, Catilina a psychopath and Clodius an ambitious playboy. Harris again proves himself a master of historical fiction with this brilliantly researched and utterly gripping novel.



Smoke in the Room **Emily Maguire**

Tp \$29.99

Set in Sydney where three people are holed up in a tiny flat off Broadway, there is American Adam,

weary activist Graeme and wild, misunderstood Kate. Each is searching for answers to life's biggest questions. Provocative, honest, brimming with sexual tension and crackling with intelligence. After Taming the Beast and The Gospel According to Luke (both Pb \$22.99), this secures Maguire's place as one of Australia's hottest new talents.

Bury Me Deep Queenpin Megan Abbott Pb \$22.99 each

Set in the 1930s and recalling the golden age of crime fiction, these are for fans of hardboiled, atmospheric crime noir novels. Based on a true-life crime, Bury Me Deep has an abandoned wife befriended by two vivacious women who sweep her into an exuberant round of parties that they host for the most powerful men in Phoenix. Before long, she is up to her pretty neck in trouble. In Queenpin, a down-at-heel young woman is hired to do the books of a seedy nightclub. Attracting the attention of the moll to end all molls, Gloria Denton, the narrator falls into a dangerously glamorous lifestyle, attracting all the wrong sort of attention. Due Dec

The Brutal Telling Louise Penny

A dark story of greed, betrayal and murder that grabs you from the very beginning to the chilling finale. This is fifth in the
