




Umberto Eco is at his most captivating and eclectic. We read not only of Botticelli and Michelangelo, but of how the fashions of the 1960s were derived from ancient Egyptian dress and how Roman and 18th-century hairstyles have much in common. Shakespeare in a Nutshell A Rhyming Guide to All the Plays




Twilight of Love Travels with Turgenev Robert Dessaix HB \$40.00




Full Bloom The Art and Life of Georgia O'Keefe

Georgia O'Keefe (1887-1986) was one of the most successful American artists of the 20th century. Her arresting paintings of enormous, intimately rendered flowers, desert landscapes and stark, white cow skulls are seminal works. But behind O'Keefe's celebrity is the life-changing breakdown of her marriage to photographer Alfred Stieglitz and her definitive relocation to New Mexico. Through personal material, including interviews with Stieglitz's long-time paramour, Dorothy Norman, this biography offers insight into the effect of her husband's infidelity on her painting and offers an honest portrayal of a life shrouded in myth. Empathetically rendered, beautiful to touch.

With 40 newly translated stories – *Little Red Riding Hood*, *Cinderella*, *Snow White* and *Rapunzel* – this majestic volume features 150 illustrations, many by legendary painters including Arthur Rackham; hundreds of notes exploring the historical origins, cultural complexities and psychological effects of the fables; and a biographical essay. Assembled for the first time, here are the very best occasional writings from one of Britain's great female writers. Articles on writers as diverse as Jane Austen and Mikhail Bulgakov sit alongside adoring pieces on her beloved cats and autobiographical grabs at thought-shaping beliefs. The range of subjects, cultures and periods is huge, but the collection is utterly consistent in one key regard: Lessing's clear-eyed vision and prose. A huge amount of wisdom and entertainment unfolds in these pages and fans of her infectiously forthright, zestful and impish spirit will love to own and read this book.


Many people have grown up with the beguiling rhythms of poems such as *Black Cockatoos* or the jauntiness of *The Wagtail*. Now in a new edition commemorating 25 years since Wright's poems were last published as a single collection, they appear with six additional poems and a personal introduction by the poet's daughter, Meredith McKinney, for whom they were originally penned. Complemented by full-colour illustrations obtained from the National Library's Pictures Collection, this is a testament to Judith Wright (1915-2000) as a passionate environmentalist, as well as a celebration of the centrality of birds to poetic imagination.

noteworthy is Tatar's decision to include tales that were censored when the Grimms discovered that parents were reading the stories to their children – stories about sex, cannibalism and children dying. Enchanting and magical, this celebrates the rich, dramatic power of the fables in the most spectacular Grimm volume in decades.







She was also full of self-doubt, fearing her face prevented her from being loved, and needing constant reassurance of her worthiness. The Dragon's Journey



Taught the gift of healing by an indigenous tribe in the Vietnamese jungle, Longy turned his back on violence forever. His abilities are now much in demand and his client list reads like a Who's Who of celebrities, from Keanu Reeves to Frank Lowy, Elle Macpherson to Rupert Murdoch. Inspirational reading.







Fires in the Dark

Yenko is a Coppersmith gypsy, the beloved son of his tribe's leader. Born in Bohemia in 1927, the gypsy way of life is increasingly threatened as the Depression and the political changes of the 1930s impact upon the settled peoples of the region. Eventually, the gypsies are sent to a concentration camp, but Yenko escapes to Prague, where he spends the rest of the war denying his heritage in order to survive. This is a powerful novel that recreates a little known part of history, sometimes with harrowing detail, but always with verve and passion. *Lindy*



Magic Seeds

V S Naipaul

This novel starts where 2001's **Half a Life** (PB \$22.00) broke off. It is a masterpiece, written with all the depth and resonance, the clarity of vision and precision of language that are Naipaul's hallmarks. Now in his early 40s, Willy Chandra joins an underground movement in India, ostensibly devoted to unfettering the lower castes. Seven years of failed revolutionary campaigns and terms of imprisonment convince him to return to England, where he finds the fruit of another unexpected social revolution (more magic seeds...)



An instant blockbuster in Italy and now an international literary phenomenon, this is the fictionalised memoir of a Sicilian teenager whose quest for love rapidly devolves into an outrageous journey of sexual discovery. She begins her diary a virgin, but a stormy affair at 14 leads her to regard sex as a means of self-discovery. In graphic detail, she describes her entry into a Dantesque underworld of eroticism. Told with disarming candour, her bittersweet tour of extreme desires is as poignant as it is titillating. A stunning erotic debut, a **Story of O** for our times.



The Polished Hoe

Austin Clarke

Layers of disturbing history slowly unfold through one woman's intimate, murderous confession. Mary-Mathilda, the fair-skinned mistress of a cruel plantation manager in Barbados, tells her story in an exquisite, dancing vernacular. It is the story of a life, a culture and a time gone by, but its meditation on love, loss and sacrifice, and its explorations of lives distorted by the horrors of racism, are utterly contemporary. Winner of the 2003 *Commonwealth Writers' Prize* and a bestseller in Canada, this remarkable novel evokes the power of memory and the indomitable strength of the human spirit.



This is a densely woven novel of the mind, at times comedic, perceptive, bizarre and moving, a rich and complex tapestry of emotion and imagination and repression. From the bestselling author of **The Last Kabbalist of Lisbon** (PB \$27.95) comes a novel that takes the reader on an epic journey from war-ravaged, 19th-century Europe to America before the Civil War. Their story is played out against a backdrop of war and chaos, which unforgettably mines the mysteries of devotion, betrayal, guilt and forgiveness. Zimler is referred to as an American Umberto Eco and this bold-hearted love story is deeply moving.





The central character is Dan Fielding, a middle-aged editor in Toronto who has remained faithful to his wife during years of marriage. Until, that is, he is sent to Europe on a business trip with his young colleague Denise... who ends up getting murdered while he sleeps. On his return to Toronto, with the story splashed across the media, he becomes accountable not only to his own family, but also to Denise's family and their mutual colleagues. The Turning

Winton's first short story collection in 20 years is really a discontinuous narrative centred on a coastal town in Western Australia. The characters may have left it behind in some stories, or are still trapped there or yet to escape, but the town has shaped their lives. Switching back and forth over three decades, many of the stories focus on one man and those closest to him. With brilliant insights and clear-eyed compassion, these tales describe the hinges of life, those incidents that change the characters forever. Powerful writing, powerful stories. Not to be missed. *Lindy*




I Have Kissed Your Lips

The Line of Beauty



Beginning where **The Swimming-Pool Library** (PB \$22.95) ended in 1983, Nick Guest has moved into an attic room in the Notting Hill home of Gerald Fedden MP, his wife Rachel and their children. They are a glamorous family whose assumptions and ambitions are boosted as Thatcher's boom years unfold. Nick, something of an innocent in the twin worlds of power and serious money, will learn a lot from them. The book is divided into three sections (dated 1983, 1986 and 1987) and it is during these years that intense transformations of self and British society are artfully drawn. Nick's first lover, Leo, is a closeted council worker who is left behind as Nick's increasingly sophisticated tastes lead to the wealthy and sinister Wani. Cocaine and threesomes are all well and good, but disaster strikes in the late 80s – a media scandal, of course – entangling both Nick and Gerald Fedden. Cleverly amusing at all times, this novel is expert social history and human tragedy. An absolute pleasure to read. *Cara*

Full of high ideals and a staunch Catholic, he wanted to achieve cultural and religious unity over his vast dominion. He struggled against Lutheranism and was forced to concede it legal recognition. The Spanish rule over the New World increased in his time. But by 1555, he was disillusioned by the impossibility of continental peace and renounced his crown to live in seclusion. A fascinating study of the man and his times.


