





## The Sense of an Ending Julian Barnes

Tony is settled and safe, looking back on his life. His schooldays were spent with his clever friends, and the enigmatic Adrian was the brightest. They are all shocked when a fellow student commits suicide, but they move on. At university, Adrian becomes involved with Tony's first girlfriend and an ugly rift is opened. Tony uncovers a dark secret, a sad and tragic mystery that will resonate with you long after finishing this book. There is also much humour, and the writing is plain and full of wonderful insights that make you pause to laugh or wonder. This short, but deeply engrossing and troubling novel is a worthy *Booker* winner. *Peter* Hb \$29.95




#### 1Q84 Haruki Murakami

The year is 1984 and the city is Tokyo. A young woman named Aomame follows a taxi driver's enigmatic suggestion and begins to notice puzzling discrepancies in the world around her. She realises she has entered a parallel existence, which she calls 1Q84. Meanwhile, an aspiring writer named Tengo takes on a suspect ghostwriting project. A love story, a mystery, a fantasy, a novel of self-discovery, a dystopia to rival George Orwell's 1984, this is Murakami's most ambitious undertaking yet. Hb \$39.95

#### Foal's Bread Gillian Mears

Northern NSW in the Depression is no place for soft dreamers. Noah is tough and independent with a talent for high-jumping horses. She catches the eye, then the heart, of Rowley Nancarrow, the Australian champion high-jumper. Their marriage is full of inarticulate love and ambition, but when Rowley survives his third lightning strike with permanent and accumulating loss of physical control, he and Noah face insurmountable difficulties. A powerful, remarkable, hauntingly beautiful novel, with pitch-perfect writing. My pick of the year. Lindy Pb \$32.99





#### Cold Light Frank Moorehouse

This is the final part in the epic story of Edith Campbell Berry. It is 1950, the League of Nations has collapsed and the newly formed United Nations has rejected all those who worked and fought for the League. Edith now has ambitions to become Australia's first female ambassador, but she finds herself caught up in the planning of the national capital. Intelligent, poignant and absorbing, this remarkable novel can be read as a stand-alone story or as a companion to **Grand Days** and **Dark Palace** (normally \$19.95 each, now **2 for the price of 1** while stocks last). #### All that I Am **Anna Funder**

Ruth Becker, a survivor of Hitler's Germany, now lives in Bondi, where she is coming to terms with getting old. 



#### The Cat's Table Michael Ondaatje







#### Poor Man's Wealth **Rod Usher**






#### The Prague Cemetery **Umberto Eco**

#### The Marriage Plot **Jeffrey Eugenides**




#### Francis Greenslade



#### Death of Kings Bernard Cornwell

As the 9th century wanes, Alfred, who has held Britain together, is dying. He wants his son Edward to succeed him, but there are other claimants to the throne. Alfred's loyal henchman, the Viking-raised but Saxon-born warrior Uhtred, is torn – his loyalties were sworn to Alfred, not to his son, and he wants to reclaim his own lands in the north... #### Conqueror Conn Iggulden

The vast Mongol nation won by Genghis Khan is under threat from their most ancient enemy. Kublai, the scholar, must learn the arts of war to protect and expand the empire. He would rule one-fifth of the world, an empire greater than Alexander's. And he would face bitter treachery from his brothers, whose actions could destroy all that the Khans have built... #### Animal People Charlotte Wood

Stephen is not an animal person. He's allergic to them. Nor can he understand how people treat animals better than humans. In fact, on this one stifling summer's day, Stephen can't understand anything about the world, or even himself. 
# GODS WITHOUT MEN HARI KUNZRU


#### I Hate Martin Amis et al Peter Barry

Milan Zorec, a frustrated (to say the least) unpublished writer decides to become a sniper in the Serbian army and becomes involved in the siege of Sarajevo. To say this is a somewhat unconventional novel would be an understatement. Barry plays with language in a most ingenious way, constantly toying with the reader. The story takes a turn into disturbing territory, recalling some of the darkest moments of Cormac McCarthy's **Blood Meridian** (\$22.99). 
# WAR & PEACE and SONYA


#### Breaking Away Anna Gavalda




#### Forecast: Turbulence Short Stories

#### Daniel Stein, Interpreter Ludmila Ulitskaya




#### Born to Run John M Green
