Sea Hearts Margo Lanagan



The back streets of Richmond, Melbourne, in 1959 are full of dangers and wonders if you're a boy who inhabits the role of superhero - one with an absent father, a griefstricken mother who can barely look at him, and the only adult who listens

to him being a petty-criminal grandfather. Having seen his twin brother Tom die in a tragic accident, he wanders his suburb aimlessly, exploring and taking advantage of open doors (and closed ones, as well) climbing fences and spying into windows. On one of his nocturnal adventures, he witnesses a vicious murder - and the killer sees him watching. From then on, the boy is both drawn back to the house, and tries to avoid the places he has seen the murderer. To this end he draws a map, and takes on the role of The Cartographer, leading him to more mysteries as he observes Richmond's underlife. His acute observations are tempered by his innocence, and the reader understands more than he does... I thoroughly enjoyed this novel. o start off 2012 with a breath of fresh air we rearranged the History shelves to provide more shelf space for this large section of the shop, and also reduced the height of the stands so you can now see right through to the Children's section in the back corner, which has also gained more space for the wonderful selection there.

The Loeb Classical Library titles (\$44.95 Hb each) are also now easier to find, next to Classical Greek and Latin, followed by the Translated Classics from Penguin and other publishers. We have a new translation of Homer's **The Iliad** by Stephen Mitchell (\$35 Pb 528pp), so you might enjoy a new slant on this eternal story. Mitchell has previously won praise for his translations of **Gilgamesh**, **The Bhagavad Gita** and **Tao Te Ching**. Other Penguin *Black Classics* remain where they were on the other side of the store in our long row of Classics, both hardback and paperback, including Vintage and Everyman.

Remember when you click on subject headings at the top of email newsletters you can see new titles for that subject. It takes a little moment for the computer to compile, but it is very useful. Of course you can also filter a title search on the home page. Once you have entered a search, you can filter by Category, Availability, Format, Price or Publication Date. By doing this, I've just discovered a new **Concise History of Russia** by Paul Bushkovitch published by Cambridge University Press (\$39.95 Pb 480pp), which I hadn't previously noticed.

In addition to Gift Cards for redemption in-store, you can now also buy Gift Vouchers for redemption online, which are handy for people who find it difficult to get to our shop. Just click on the link on our home page and you can choose to have the Gift Voucher emailed directly to the recipient, or to yourself so you can email it to them later, or perhaps print it out and give it to them if you wish.

I've had a marvellous time reading Claire Tomalin's latest biography. This time it is Charles Dickens: A Life (\$39.95 Hb 527pp incl index, bibliography, notes and illustrations). Of course Tomalin was already familiar with the life of Dickens because she wrote the groundbreaking The Invisible Woman: The Story of Nelly Ternan and Charles Dickens (\$26.95 Pb 352pp). In this new book, I discovered another author had previously written about Nelly Ternan. This was in Thomas Wright's The Life of Charles Dickens, published in 1935 and dismissed by Dickens' horrified admirers. The phenomenon that was Dickens takes a bit of unravelling. Tomalin's biography is both sympathetic and truthful, enlivened by many quotations from his novels and letters. I'm sure it will send you off to read some of his stories, all of which can be found at Abbey's. David Copperfield was Dickens' own favourite and there are several editions in Classics, and upstairs in Language Book Centre we also have an Oxford Bookworm edition (\$13 Pb) intended for English as a Second Language readers.

I discovered that Nelly's older sister Fanny became the second wife of Thomas Trollope, brother of the great Anthony Trollope and son of the successful novelist Mrs Frances Trollope, who wrote, amongst many other things, **Domestic Manners of the Americans**, which is still available in Penguin Classics. It is indent only so remains at the old price of \$24.95. This becomes rather confusing because Fanny wrote several novels which were published by Dickens in his magazine *All the Year Round* and the older Mrs Frances Trollope was often called Fanny. I think I'd like to read more about the older Mrs Trollope, who earlier set off to Memphis to assist in the founding of a Utopian city called New Harmony.

I am a great fan of Claire Tomalin, whose other biographies include **Katherine Mansfield: A Secret Life** (\$29.95 Pb 304pp), **Jane Austen: A Life** (\$26.95 Pb 384pp), **Samuel Pepys: The Unequal Self** (\$24.95 Pb 544pp) and **Thomas Hardy: The Time-Torn Man** (\$26.95 Pb 512pp). There are four or five other biographies which seem to be out of print, including my favourite, **Mrs Jordan's Profession**.

Here's an interesting book - **Running the Show: Governors of the British Empire** by Stephanie Williams (\$22.95 Pb 352pp). It is a fascinating account of some of those ordinary men in

strange places doing their best, and sometimes just having a good time! Williams has chosen some very different Governors, including William Bloomfield Douglas, who with an uncertain past (part of which was certainly spent helping Brooke become the first White Rajah of Sarawak) was Harbour Master of Adelaide when he was dispatched to found an outlet for the Northern Territory at Palmerston, later Darwin. He immediately called himself Governor and it was hell there. Contrast him to Lord and Lady Tennyson (son of the great Poet Laureate), who were appointed to South Australia from 1889 to 1903, and later to Victoria. They upheld all the Victorian values and were looked upon as close to royalty. Other characters include John Pope Hennessy in Hong Kong (1877-82) and Sir Frank Lugard and his famous wife Flora Shaw, who had been the Colonial Editor of The Times, and their exciting adventures in Northern Nigeria. What about Frank Athelstane Swettenham, who worked his way up and up in Malaya (1874-1903). And then there's a marvellous account of British East Africa (1909-12), and another (1877-80) of Sir Bartle Frere and his influential wife coping with the "washing of the spears". Then of course they had to go home, where nobody cared about them.

Jennifer Kloester must have had a hard time researching **Georgette Heyer: Biography of a Bestseller** (Hb 464pp currently an *Abbey's Choice* title at \$35). The prolific Queen of Regency Romance never gave an interview, but Kloester had access to all sorts of family records. Heyer's witty and stylish stories have it all – disgraced noblemen, notorious highwaymen, cheats and men of honour, and of course delightful heroines. We have a large selection of her books, some in Crime, some in Historical Fiction. These books were meticulously researched. Try one for an amusing time. I always thought the *Booker Prize* was partly funded by sales of Agatha Christie's novels, whose copyright they owned. Now it seems that Georgette Heyer also sold the rights to some of her crime stories to Booker-McConnell.

It seems unusual to be reading a new novel about the First World War, but I found Louisa Young's **My Dear, I Wanted to Tell You** (\$27.95 Pb 328pp) a very worthwhile read. She has taken her idea from the pre-printed card that soldiers were given so they could advise relatives they were wounded and, hopefully, in hospital (a far better place to be than in the trenches). The central character is a clever, aspiring young man from a poor family who is befriended by two rich and artistic families living nearby. There are overtones of A S Byatt's **The Children's Book** (\$19.95 Pb 624pp), but with more attention to the fighting and to the early work on facial surgery which took place at Frognal, in Sidcup, Kent. Coincidentally, Frognal is the family home of the Townshend family, as in **Lord Sydney: The Life and Times of Tommy Townshend** by Andrew Tink (\$39.95 Pb).



The central character of **The Gift of Speed** (\$24.95 Pb 350pp) is 16-year-old Michael, who dreams of bowling a very fast ball and being in the local cricket team. And for the aspiring young cricketer in your family, it's hard to go past **How to Play Cricket** by Don Bradman (\$19.95), a small hardback with photographs of The Don himself, which would make a nice little gift.

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




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
