#### Lord Sydney The Life and Times of Tommy Townshend Andrew Tink

Following his first award-winning biography – William Charles Wentworth: Australia's Greatest Native Son (360pp Hb \$49.99) – Tink's new book is about English politician Thomas Townshend - known as Tommy before becoming Baron and later Viscount (Lord) Sydney, from whence we get Sydney Cove and the name of our sparkling city. As Home Secretary in William Pitt's government, Sydney was the first to announce King George III's decision to send out the First Fleet in August 1786. Sydney's influence as Home Secretary was considerable and his close relationship with Governor Phillip, whom he selected to command the fleet and to be governor, influenced the establishment of a penal colony based upon rational and humane principles. 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Secrets LIES 6 modern classics, all with deception or hidden truths at their heart. Now only \$14.99 each



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acclaimed novel some years before, is suffering from writer's block, and from a wilful blindness that ignores the poverty his family endures. His second wife, Topaz, a beautiful, fey, ex-artist's model, likes to commune with nature wearing nothing but boots. Cassandra's older sister, Rose, is a scheming romantic; and Thomas, their intelligent younger brother, lives in his own world. When wealthy Americans become their landlords, Rose (who has always wanted to live in a Jane Austen novel), decides she will marry Simon, the heir, despite not loving him. Cassandra chronicles all this in an endearingly clear-eyed style, recording amusing episodes and more serious matters, including her own inconvenient love for Simon... This is a beautifully polished, seemingly effortless, novel, one which I have revisited with a great deal of pleasure many times over the years and which still retains its charms. Lindy

She is resentful of him breaking up her family, of her mother for making her go, and just of life, generally. Waiting for the next plane out, she meets Oliver, who she resents as well - at first. Finding herself thrown into his company and assuming he is heading to see his family reluctantly as well, they connect. Everything goes well until they arrive in London... This is one of those sweet books perfect for whiling away a few hours on a hot summer's day, and while the target audience is older teenaged girls, it fits that crossover segment nicely! Pb \$22.99

#### The Princess and the Pig Jonathan Emmett

A poor farmer's piglet and a rich queen's baby girl are swapped one day. The king knew what had happened, because (as he points to a copy of *Sleeping Beauty*) it happens all the time in books where bad fairies intervene. The farmer's wife (pointing to *Thumbelina*) knows she got a daughter because good fairies do that sort of thing all the time in books. #### Grandpa Green Lane Smith

Grandpa Green was born a long time ago, before TV or computers, growing up on a farm, going to fight in a war instead of studying, marrying and having kids. His great-grandson tells the story, simply, while playing in Grandpa's garden, which itself tells the story as well, through topiary. Grandpa is forgetting things, but the garden remembers for him. A charming and gentle picturebook about the bonds of family, beautifully illustrated - in green, of course! Ages 4-6. Hb \$19.99

H ere's wishing you a Happy and Healthy New Year – and I quite like that other word which is sometimes used.... Prosperous New Year! And maybe even New Year filled with Sunshine (which seems in rather short supply in December while I write this).

Firstly, nice news. Poet Robert Gray received the \$50,000 Emeritus Award from the Australia Council, which is especially gratifying as it is decided by the writer's peers. His New Selected Poetry (\$19.99 Pb), first published in 1999, is in stock, but his most recent work has been to compile, with Geoffrey Lehmann, the massive anthology Australian Poetry Since 1788 (\$69.95 Hb 1,108pp). This 'must have' for any reader of Australian poetry contains over 1,000 poems from 170 Australian poets, as well as short critical biographies of some. I've heard tell that this major work received extra financial support via a personal donation from a local book lover. Be sure to also read Robert's memoir published in 2008, The Land I Came Through Last (\$34.95 Pb 436pp), which is beautifully written. I was intrigued to read that as a small boy he spent time at the Royal Far West Children's Home in Manly – in fact he ran away from there and was caught on the Manly ferry! Very exciting. Now, in 2012, the famous Royal Far West Home, originally begun to provide medical services for children from the outback, is facing up to the 21st century with a plan to replace the buildings overlooking Manly Beach. Locals, like me, are keeping an eye on these plans.

Retired NSW politician Andrew Tink came to our 28th Annual Zonta Meet the Author Evening on the last Wednesday in November. He has previously written a biography of one of New South Wales' most picaresque early politicians, William Charles Wentworth: Australia's Greatest Native Son (\$49.99 Hb 360pp) which won the Copyright Agency Limited Prize last year. Australian Scholarly Press has now issued his second book Lord Sydney: The Life and Times of Tommy Townshend (\$39.95 Hb 315pp). You won't be surprised to hear that you don't sound the "h" in that name. Tommy came from a famous British political family and was described as "a John Bull figure, full of bumptious self-confidence". He spent most of his life in opposition, but he was Home Secretary when the decision was made to send convicts to Australia, so he was the one who commissioned the ships to sail. Andrew gleefully pointed out one of the fine illustrations in his book. This is a facsimile of a page listing all the people working under Townshend, a total of 17 staff to run the entire Empire! These 17 people included two under-secretaries, a tea lady and a porter! His name appears often in our Australian surroundings, but during his lifetime he was more active in supporting the American colonists in their desire for independence.

Nicholas Hasluck found some good reasons to use his Frequent Flyer points and came all the way from Perth to join us at the Zonta Meet the Author Evening. Readers of the third volume of Frank Moorhouse's Edith Trilogy, **Cold Light** (\$29.99 Pb 368pp), will get special pleasure from Nicholas' book **Dismissal** (\$29.99 Pb 368pp) as it begins in early Canberra among a group of permanent public servants, about the same time Edith returned to Canberra after the collapse of the League of Nations.

We did receive some criticism about the Zonta night – in that all the authors were men, whereas the Zonta Club is one which works to improve the status of women! Fair criticism, but it just so happened that two female authors I invited were not able to come. We raised over \$900 so that was worthwhile.

I'm looking forward to reading the new book by Michael Lewis, a terrific American writer who has managed to make Economics exciting. In fact, the listing in *Books in Print* includes Humour as well as Economics as a possible category for **Boomerang:** *The Meltdown Tour* (\$39.95 Hb 240pp) wherein he travels across Europe investigating the results of the Global Financial Crisis. His other books include **Panic:** *The Story of Modern Financial Insanity* (\$26.95 Pb 400pp) and **The Big Short:** *Inside the Doomsday Machine* (\$24.95 Pb 288pp). You will appreciate that Michael Lewis can tell a good story when I remind you that he is also the author of two books which AUSTRALIAN POETRY SINCE 1788















have been made into successful movies. The first is **Blind Side** (\$19.95 Pb 320pp) about the big American footballer who was adopted by a family and became a huge star. Sandra Bullock won her *Academy Award* for this. The other is **Moneyball:** *The Art of Winning an Unfair Game* (\$19.95 Pb 320pp) about the coach who decided to buy cheaper players and make them into a prize-winning team. I won't miss this new film starring Brad Pitt.

I made sure I gave copies of A Little History of the World *Illustrated Edition* by E H Gombrich (\$34.95 Hb 304pp with over 200 illustrations) to my grandchildren. In fact I want one myself. This beautifully written, sweeping history of the world from the Stone Age to the atomic bomb is made more complete by the gorgeous illustrations, many suggested by Gombrich at the time. It is not dominated by facts and figures and has lovely clear maps. It reads like a story and even if you are not especially interested in history it will be useful. You will know a little about many famous events which pop up in conversation or reading. It was first published in German in 1935, and published in English in 2005, by which time Gombrich was especially famous for his unsurpassed The Story of Art (\$59.95 Pb). This is now in its 16th revised edition and is a permanent title in the Art section of any decent bookshop. We also have a paperback edition of A Little History of the World without the illustrations. This is \$24.95 and is in the Children's section.

Lindy Jones is settling in to her new desk where she is in control of our Children's Section. We're hoping that soon we will have better access to the wonderful selection of children's books she has chosen, ranging from familiar classics to the latest craze, whether it is Harry Potter or Stephenie Meyer or Jeff Kinney. I gave one of Jeff Kinney's **Diary of a Wimpy Kid:** *Roderick Rules* (\$14.95 Pb 226pp) to grandson Will, already a keen reader. As the Wimpy Kid is about 12 or 13, with all the anxieties of that age, this series is a great introduction for boys (and girls) of that age. The typeface is easy and there are funny line drawings. Upstairs in **Language Book Centre** they have some of these books in Swedish, French, Persian, German, Italian, Dutch and Spanish. If they don't have the one you would like, I am sure they can order them for you.

I have read Julian Barnes' Man Booker Prize-winner The Sense of an Ending (\$29.95 Hb 160pp) and I'm more than pleased that this was judged the winner for 2011 and I also feel sure that all the people who got this for Christmas will be pleased. Barnes' forte is to take apart the actions and emotions, especially of men, men of ordinary passions - and find some intriguing insight that makes them no longer ordinary. He is also an accomplished short story writer, as you will find in Lemon Table (\$24.95 Pb 224pp) or Pulse (\$14.95 Pb). Years ago he was famous for the book with the wonderful title **Flaubert's Parrot** (\$12.95 Pb 192pp) in which he dissected the famous French writer who borrowed a parrot from the museum for his own research. Another book is Arthur and George (\$12.95 Pb) about two very different men, one famous and the other ordinary, living in 19th century Britain. I plan to read Before She Met Me (\$24.95 Pb 144pp) about a husband who has left his wife for a younger woman and now begins to wonder what his new wife is really like. Also, because all these books are not long, I plan to read The Porcupine (\$24.95 Pb 144pp) about a deposed party leader on trial in a Soviet satellite state. It is a relief to know that you can rely on Julian Barnes to always produce a first-class, intelligent novel. We do also have an audio edition of another of his famous books A History of the World in Ten and a Half Chapters

(\$94.95 9CDs) which of course is not history at all but is another of his short story collections.
