Living at the quiet end of speculative fiction is the 'written Thursday Next', eager to prove herself worthy of her illustrious namesake. The written Thursday is soon hot on the trail of her factual alter ego, and stumbles upon a plot so fiendish that it threatens the very BookWorld itself.

The Blasphemer

Nigel Farndale

He had always been scared of flying. Now the fear is real. A plane crash. The water is rising over his mouth. In his nostrils. Lungs. As Daniel gasps, he swallows; and

punches at his seatbelt. Nancy, the woman he loves, is trapped in her seat. He clambers over her, pushing her face into the headrest. It is a reflex, visceral action made without rational thought... But he did it. And already we have judged him from the comfort of our own lives. Almost 100 years earlier, Daniel's great-grandfather goes over the top at Passchendaele. A shell explodes and he wakes up alone and lost in the hell of no-man's-land. Where are the others? Has he been left behind? And if he doesn't find his unit, is he a deserter? Love; cowardice; trust; forgiveness. How will any of us behave when we are pushed to extremes?

The Oracle of Stamboul

Michael David Lukas 320pp Tp \$32.99

A magical historical novel about an astonishing eight-year-old girl in the last days of the Ottoman Empire. It is 1877, on the shores of the Black

Sea, and the omens for the newborn Eleonora Cohen are hardly promising. Not only does her mother die in childbirth, but her village is being attacked by the Tsar's Royal Cavalry. However, despite this bad beginning, a sour stepmother and a traumatic journey in the hold of a ship, she grows into a remarkably clever and engaging child. But when a heartbreaking tragedy leaves her marooned in Istanbul, where spies and and sudden death are as much a part of life as delicious spices and rosewater, it is her extraordinary courage and character which lead her straight to the Sultan's court, and to her salvation.

To Algeria, With Love

Suzanne Ruta

288pp Tp \$29.99

Louise, an American innocent, takes up a scholarship in the south of France in winter 1961 and promptly falls for Wally, a gregarious Algerian worker in flight from brutal colonial war. He

teaches her about life and love in a chilly furnished room, against a background of French pop music that makes it all seem easy. But families and history reassert their claim and the inevitable separation leaves lasting wounds. 40 years later, finally old enough to understand how young she was back then, Louise enlists the help of another Algerian exile in an attempt to make amends.

Farundell

L R Fredericks

In the golden summer of 1924, Paul Asher, still shattered by the trauma of the Western Front, comes to Farundell, an idyllic country house set deep in the Oxfordshire countryside. He falls

under the spell of the rich and eccentric Damory family: the celebrated Amazon explorer Perceval; Lord Damory, now blind and dying, whose story echoes Paul's own strange dreams; brilliant 13-year-old Alice, on the cusp of adulthood and, like Paul, a seeker of knowledge; and, most fatefully, the wild and beautiful Sylvie, with whom he falls passionately in love. Before summer's end, there will be tragedy, comedy, resolution and, for Paul, a revelation that will change his life forever.

Last Dance with Valentino

August 1916, leaving war-ravaged London, Jenny Doyle sets sail for America. As she draws near the soaring skyscrapers of New York, her dreams are dashed when she learns she is to be sent to work for the wealthy de Saulles family.

Known as 'the Box', their home is Gatsby-like in elegance, yet rife with undertones of malice and madness. Only her friendship with dancer Rodolfo offers her a chance to escape... August 1926, as Rudolph Valentino fights for his life, barricades keep the swarming fans at bay. Adored by millions of women, but loved by only one... Will she be able to reach him in time?

The Andreas family is an eccentric one. Their father - a renowned, eccentric professor of Shakespeare who communicates almost exclusively in Shakespearean

verse - named all three girls for great Shakespearean women - Rose (Rosalind), Bean (Bianca) and Cordy (Cordelia). As a result, the girls find they have a lot to live up to. With this burden, as well as others they shoulder, they have a difficult time communicating with both their parents and their lovers, but especially with each other. Why can't Rose leave her home town for the man she loves? Why has glamorous Bean come home from New York City with her tail between her legs to the small college town she swore she'd leave as soon as she could? And why suddenly has Cordy resurfaced after years of gypsy living? Each sister has found her life nothing like she had thought it would be - and suddenly faced with their parents' frailty and their own disappointments and setbacks, their usual quick salve of a book can't solve what ails them. As it turns out, the small town of Barnwell and their sisterly bond offer much more than they ever expected.

A Discovery of Witches

When historian Diana Bishop opens an alchemical manuscript in the Bodleian Library, it's an unwelcome intrusion of magic into her carefully ordered life. Though she is a witch of impeccable lineage, the violent death of her







"You do not know me yet. My son Thomas, who is publishing this book, tells me it is customary at this place in a novel to give the reader a little taste of the

story that is held within these pages. As your storyteller, I am to convey that this tale is set in Jamaica during the last turbulent years of slavery and the early years of freedom that followed. July is a slave girl who lives upon a sugar plantation named Amity and it is her life that is the subject of this tale. She was there when the Baptist War raged in 1831, and she was also present when slavery was declared no more. My son says I must convey how the story tells also of July's mama Kitty, of the negroes that worked the plantation land, of Caroline Mortimer, the white woman who owned the plantation, and many more persons besides - far too many for me to list here. But what befalls them all is carefully chronicled upon these pages for you to peruse." Longlisted for the 2010 Orange Prize and shortlisted for the Man Booker Prize, this is a breathtaking, hauntingly beautiful novel.

Flock

Lyn Hughes 364pp

Sydney, 1950. Following a chance encounter at Central Station, Francis Sprigge and Lilian Powys, two strangers

escaping their past, fall in love and move to the Blue Mountains to follow their dream of a creative life. But as Francis immerses himself in his newfound passion for designing exquisite wallpaper, Lilian finds that the life she has always craved is inexplicably beyond her reach, despite her loving husband and their young daughter Addie. However hard she tries to come to terms with the past, she ends up with more questions than answers, and cracks begin to appear in the family's harmonious veneer, with startling repercussions. Nearly 30 years later, Addie returns to the Blue Mountains to lead a small group of conservators in the restoration of a historic house to its 19th century glory. But as they peel back the layers of wallpaper and begin to uncover the secrets of the house, all four find the past resurfacing in unexpected ways.

True Soldier Gentlemen

Adrian Goldsworthy 400pp Tp \$32.99

The year is 1808, and Hamish Williams is a 'gentlemen volunteer' in the 106th regiment

of foot, a man serving with the ranks, but living with the officers, and uncomfortable in both worlds: looked down on by those with the money or influence to buy their rank, and distrusted by the common soldiers who know he is not one of them. But he is determined to prove by deeds alone that he is a man worthy of advancement, and when the 106th embarks for Portugal to begin what will become known as the Peninsula War against Napoleon, he knows his chance of glory is at hand. Soon he is receiving a sharp lesson in the realities of war, as the 106th undergoes a bloody baptism at the hands of the French - and he realises his single-minded devotion to honour may not, after all, be the quickest route to promotion.

Each 30-second summation comes with a 3-second 'thrash' and a 3-minute thought and pointers to related subjects. Excellent introductions to big ideas, with wellregarded contributors. Pitched to older readers, but suitable for anyone with an interest in the topics.

are plain black and white birds with nothing special about them. Mozzie, who is three minutes older than Midgie, suggests a number of ways to beautify themselves. He is very inventive, but his younger and more sensible sibling keeps bringing him back to earth. A charming and warmhearted story about looking for your strengths and appreciating what you already have, illustrated predominantly in primary colours and fairly simple shapes used inventively. well worth the reading! Ages 14+





But eventually he came to the attention of those 'guarding' this drowned city. Only then did his nightmare really begin. Winner of the American Book Award and the LA Times Book Award.

Patrick & Henry Cockburn 256pp Tp \$35.00


On a cold February day two months after his 20th birthday, Henry Cockburn waded into the Newhaven estuary outside

Brighton and tried to swim across, almost drowning in the process. The trees, he said, had told him to do it. Nearly halfway around the world, in Kabul, Afghanistan, journalist Patrick Cockburn learned that Henry, his son, had been admitted to a hospital mental ward and appeared to be suffering a mental breakdown. An achingly honest, harrowing and resonant dual memoir about Henry's sudden descent into schizophrenia.



Five Sisters, One Remarkable Family and the Woman Who Risked Everything to Keep Them Safe

When the Taliban took control of Kabul, Kamila Sediqi and all the women of Kabul saw their lives transformed. Overnight, they were banned from schools and offices and even forbidden from leaving their homes on their own. The economy collapsed and young men left the city in search of work and security. Desperate to help her family and support her five brothers and sisters at home, Kamila began sewing clothes in her living room. Little did she know that this would be the beginning of a dressmaking business that would create jobs and hope for 100 neighbourhood women and would come to mean the difference between starvation and survival for hundreds of families like her own.

A Widow's Story


Joyce Carol Oates 450pp Tp \$35.00

"My husband died, my life collapsed." One February morning in 2008, Joyce drove her ailing husband to the emergency room of the Princeton Medical Centre, where he was diagnosed with pneumonia. She expected him to be discharged within a day or two. But in less than a week he was dead, having acquired a virulent infection in hospital, and she was suddenly faced with the reality of widowhood. She shares the derangement of denial, the anguish of loss, the disorientation of the survivor amid a nightmare of death duties, and the solace of friendship. She writes unflinchingly of the experience of grief - the almost unbearable suspense of the hospital vigil, the treacherous pools of memory that surround us, the vocabulary of illness and the absurdities of commercialised forms of mourning. Enlivened by the piercing vision, acute perception and mordant humour that are the hallmarks of her fiction, this is an extremely moving tale of life and death, love and grief.

Manhood for Amateurs

Michael Chabon 320pp Pb \$24.99 *Pulitzer Prize*-winning author of The Amazing

Adventures of Kavalier and Clay (Pb \$24.99) offers his first major work of non-fiction, an autobiographical narrative as inventive and powerful as his novels. In these insightful, provocative, slyly interlinked essays, he presents his autobiography and vision of life in the way so many of us



experience our own: as a series of reflections, regrets and re-examinations, each sparked by a present encounter, that holds some legacy of the past. What does it mean to be a man today? As a son, a husband and above all as a father of four young children, his memories of childhood, of his parents' marriage and divorce, of moments of painful adolescent comedy and giddy encounters with the popular art and literature of his own youth, are like a theme played - on different instruments, with a fresh tempo and in a new key - by the mad quartet of which he now finds himself co-conductor.

The True Story of Titanic Thompson

Kevin Cook 256pp

This is a rollicking biography of one of the most charismatic characters in 20th century America. Like Howard Hughes or Bonnie and Clyde, Alvin



'Titanic' Thompson was one of the great figures of this freewheeling era. Yet hardly anyone knows Titanic's name today. This was a man who travelled with only his golf clubs, a .45 revolver and a suitcase full of cash; he married five girls, the oldest just 18 on her wedding day. He murdered five men, though he'd say "they'd all agree they had it coming to them"; won and lost millions when a pro golfer would earn \$10,000 a year, he was playing single holes for \$20,000. Filled with fascinating facts and famous faces, this is a brilliant snapshot of life on the road in 20th century America.

Me, Myself and Lord Byron

Julietta Jameson

Byron was a poet who lived life writ large. Smart, funny, good-looking, troubled, sexually ambiguous, he left for Europe in self-imposed exile in 1822 and was never to return. But rather than running away, he stood defiant and found himself a new identity. So when journalist




Julietta Jameson came to a crossroads, she looked to the poet she'd admired since childhood and decided on her own travels to Europe, in Byron's footsteps. She knew she was sending herself on her own passage of exile, one that would allow her to cut ties with the elements of her life that no longer served her. She embarks on a journey through the life of the infamous Lord Byron; and simultaneously through her own life -tainted by a troubled upbringing, a swathe of failed relationships and an unhealthy love of alcohol. In the tradition of Eat, Pray, Love (Pb \$24.95), we follow her through Italy and Greece to find out what life really is about.

Lesley Blanch Inner Landscapes, Wilder Shores Anne Boston 384pp Pb \$3

Anne Boston

384pp Pb \$27.99

Blanch - writer, artist and adventuress - followed her own compass in everything she did. She called herself a romantic traveller and her appetite for the exotic colours all her books. The first, The Wilder Shores of Love (Pb \$27.99), became a worldwide bestseller. Emotions, she insisted,




can be transposed to places or countries, and in this, she was her own best example. Her guiding passion for Russia began in childhood; later she found the 'eternal Slav' in Romain Gary, diplomat and writer, and with him embarked on a series of postings from Bulgaria to Los Angeles. After their divorce, she transferred her obsession to Turkey, Persia and the Islamic East, where she travelled widely, with tremendous baggage. She eventually settled on the Cote d'Azur in a small pink villa dressed as exotically as herself. Boston draws on publishers' archives, unpublished journals and conversations with those who knew her to piece together the portrait of an escapist for whom character plus opportunity equalled fortune.





Death and the Virgin

Elizabeth, Dudley and the Mysterious Fate of Amy Robsart

Chris Skidmore 456pp Pb \$24.99

Elizabeth came to the throne in 1558 a 25-year-old virgin - the most prized catch in Christendom. For the first 10 years of her reign, one matter



dominated above all others: the question of who the queen was to marry and when she would produce an heir. Elizabeth's life as England's Virgin Queen is one of the most celebrated in history. Skidmore takes a fresh look at the familiar story of a gueen with the stomach of a man, steadfastly refusing to marry for the sake of her realm, and reveals a very different picture; of a vulnerable young woman, in love with her suitor, Robert Dudley. Had it not been for the mysterious and untimely death of Dudley's wife, Amy Robsart, Elizabeth might have one day been able to marry him, since Amy was believed to be dying of breast cancer. Instead, the suspicious circumstances surrounding Amy's death cast a long shadow over Elizabeth's life, preventing any hope of a union with Dudley and ultimately shaping the course of Tudor history. Using newly discovered evidence from the archives, this book puts an end to centuries of speculation as to the true causes of Amy's death.

Book of Fire

William Tyndale, Thomas More and the Bloody Birth of the English Bible

The great echoing phrases of the King James Bible that have

boomed through the English-speaking mind for 400 years (an eye for an eye; eat, drink and be merry; man shall not live by bread alone; death, where is thy sting?) are largely the work of a man whose genius for words matches Shakespeare. But William Tyndale, the young Gloucestershire tutor who wrote them, paid for them with his life. He was persecuted, exiled and eventually burned at the stake. This is the thrilling, moving story of the man who first translated the word of God into the English vernacular. Tyndale did so in defiance of church and state, hunted by the implacable enmity and the agents of the sainted Thomas More. He was finally betrayed, but by then his courage and poetic instinct had provided the backbone of the single most significant work in the English language.

When writing his magnificent life of Robert Peel (Pb \$39.99), Hurd found himself caught up again in a debate that has always fascinated him - the argument between the liberal interventionist, or the more conservative diplomatic approach to cooperation between nations. He begins with the dramatic

antagonism after Waterloo between Canning (liberal, populist, interventionist) and Castlereagh (institutions, compromise, real politics) - the last occasion on which ministerial colleagues fought a duel. A generation later comes Palmerston vs Aberdeen, from which Palmerston, the noisy interventionist, emerged the victor. Finally Eden and Bevin, from wholly different backgrounds, combined with the Americans to create a post-war compromise, which served its purpose for half a century, but is coming apart today as the old questions resurface in new and savage forms in an era of terrorism and racial conflict.

Mission to China Matteo Ricci and the Jesuit Encounter with the East



Laven tells the extraordinary story of the first Jesuit mission to China. Confronting enormous challenges, the Italian priest Matteo Ricci and a tiny handful of learned companions gained permission from the notoriously xenophobic Wanli emperor to settle in the fabled Forbidden City. Living among eunuchs and mandarins, wearing the clothes of Confucian scholars, Ricci and his associates strove to master the language and culture of their hosts. At the same time, they energetically preached the virtues of Western art and science.

However, by the end of that decade, Victorian Britons would experience a new brilliance in their streets, town halls and other public places. Electricity had come to town! Weightman brings to life not just the most celebrated electrical pioneers, such as Thomas Edison, but also the men such as Rookes Crompton, who lit Henley Regatta in 1879; Sebastian Ziani de Ferranti, a direct descendant of one of the Venetian Doges, who built Britain's first major power station on the Thames at Deptford; and Anglo-Irish aristocrat Charles Parsons, inventor of the steam turbine, which revolutionised the generation of electricity. This book takes in the electrification of the tramways and the London Underground, the transformation of the home with 'labour saving' devices and the vital modernising of industry during two world wars.

Life of Pee The Story of How Urine Got Everywhere





They included the Tsar's mother, the Dowager Empress Marie; his sister, the Grand Duchess Xenia; Prince Felix Youssupov, the murderer of Rasputin and a man once mooted as a future leader of Russia; and Grand Duke Nicholas, once Commander-in-Chief of the Russian Armies. As the ship prepared to set sail, a British sloop carrying 400 White Russian soldiers drew up alongside. The soldiers stood on deck and sang the Russian National Anthem. It was the last time the anthem was ever sung to members of the Imperial Family in Russian territory. The Dowager Empress stood on deck alone. According to the HMS Marlborough's First Lieutenant, nobody dared to approach her. Welch vividly recreates this unlikely voyage, with its bizarre assortment of warring characters and its priceless cargo of treasures, including rolled-up Rembrandts and Faberge eggs - for they were a family riven with hostility and mutual resentment.

He examines grammar rules, regional accents, swearing, spelling, dictionaries, political correctness and the role of electronic media in reshaping language. He also takes a look at such niggling concerns as the split infinitive, elocution and text messaging. Peopled with intriguing characters - such as Jonathan Swift, H W Fowler and George Orwell, as well as the more disparate figures of Lewis Carroll, Buffy the Vampire Slayer and Lenny Bruce - this is an essential volume for anyone interested in the state of the English language today or intrigued about its future.

Here's a recommendation for those of you interested in British politics during the 20th century. Climbing the Bookshelves by Shirley Williams (\$55 Hb, \$27.99 Pb, 432pp) is the autobiography of a woman who took part in most of the changes in Britain since the Second World War. Daughter of the famous writer and feminist Vera Brittain, she grew up in a household constantly aware of the political scene and she was fascinated by politics all her life. She was evacuated to

America during the war for several years, so also had an understanding of the American view. She was a Minister in the Labor governments of both Harold Wilson and Jim Callaghan, and was one of the Gang of Four who founded the Social Democratic Party. She knew an awful lot of people and still, in her seventies, contributes to democracy, and not only in her role as a Professor at the Harvard University's School of Government. If you lived in Britain at this time, you will relish her insider's view of the history you lived through.

I was anxious to read Gail Jones' new novel, as I was sorry her book Sorry (\$24.95 Pb) didn't win the *Miles Franklin* in 2008, although on the other hand I was glad Steven Carroll received the recognition he deserved for his trilogy The Art of the Engine Driver, The Gift of Speed and The Time We Have Taken (all \$24.99 Pb), extolling the quiet changes in a Melbourne suburb over the decades. Gail's earlier books were Dreams of Speaking, Sixty Lights and Black Mirror (all \$24.95 Pb). Her new book, inspired by Kenneth

Slessor's poem, is called Five Bells: Four Individuals, One Radiant Sydney Day (\$29.95 Pb 216pp). Ellie, a young woman, newly arrived in Sydney, is remembering her adolescence in Western Australia; another woman, an Irish journalist, newly arrived, is remembering her beloved brother; an older Chinese woman is remembering the horrors of the re-education camps and her life in Australia; and an unhappy young man, who had

been the teenage lover of Ellie, has arranged to meet her after many years. It begins sketchily, but builds to a most satisfying round. I thought the Irish episodes the least successful, but continue to admire this intelligent and perceptive writing. Recommended indeed.

Remember Abbey's is one of the very few bookshops in the world to stock ALL the titles in the Loeb Classical Library distributed by Harvard University Press (all Hb \$44.95). These are facing-page, dual-language titles in Greek (green covers) or Latin (red covers). We can only do this because of you, our clever customers. If they didn't sell, we couldn't stock them.

We now have another series distributed by Harvard University Press called the Dumbarton Oaks Medieval Library. These present original Byzantine Greek, Medieval Latin and Old English texts with facing-page translations in English. The first three titles have just arrived (all Hb \$49.95). They are The Vulgate Bible: Vol #1 The Pentateuch in the Douay-Rheims, a translation from the 16th century. There will be five volumes in this set. Also arrived is The Beowulf Manuscript, edited and translated by Robert Fulk, Professor at Bloomington University. This also includes, from the sole surviving Beowulf manuscript, Passion of St Christopher, Wonders of the East, Letter of Alexander the Great to Aristotle, and the poem Judith. The third title is The Arundel Lyrics / The Poems of Hugh Primas, edited and translated by Christopher McDonough, Emeritus Professor of Classics at the University of Toronto. These are all out of my range, but I am sure Abbey's will have some scholars and readers who will be fascinated to see these classics made available.

Of course, we do have other editions of Beowulf, not least the verse translation by Seamus Heaney, edited by Daniel Donoghue in the Norton Critical edition (\$32.95 Pb). This also includes a glossary of personal names and very extensive bibliography, plus the web address for you to hear Heaney read 600 lines of his translation.

I notice the 16th edition of The Chicago Manual of Style in our Writing & Publishing section (\$105 Hb 1,056pp). 16th edition really says something, doesn't it? It must be a major job to keep this famous standard up to date. I also noticed an obituary in February for John Pitson, the originator of the Australian Government's Style Manual: For Authors, Editors and Printers, now in its 6th edition (\$44.95 Hb 550pp).




Lots of our customers have been buying Puzzled: Secrets and Clues from a Life Lost in Words by David Astle (\$29.99 Pb 424pp), who sets crosswords some days for the *Sydney Morning Herald* and is the adjudicator on the SBS program *Letters and Numbers*. Although called a memoir, it is really a rave about the history of word games, puzzles, quizzes and other brain-teasers. There are some puzzles (and solutions) at the end, but you get lots of clues for solving some of those other tortures, not least cryptic crosswords. Upstairs in our Games section you can find your own brand of amusement, from Chess, Scrabble and Sudoku to Tredoku, Card Games and even Enigma 3: The Big Book of Mathematical Brain Teasers and Games of Logic (\$39.95 Hb 384pp).

Whilst upstairs you can browse around in the stock of Language Book Centre, which has dictionaries for languages from Arabic to Yoruba (I think that's something like 104 languages). In the English as a Second Language section, I found a very new type of dictionary called The Oxford Collocations Dictionary for Students of English (\$69.95 Hb 992pp, incl CD-ROM for pronunciation). I'm none too sure how to pronounce this, but it's a dictionary which suggests many adjectives and adverbs which can usually go with a

noun. For instance, next to "mist", you are offered "dense, heavy, thick" etc, then it moves on to "be shrouded in" and "vanish in". A really useful book. I took it to mean co-locations, but maybe collocations is a new word in the world of linguistics? An excellent idea with 250,000 offerings.

While shelving in poetry, I found a little treasure for someone. This is The Peacock and the Buffalo: The Poetry of Nietzsche (\$56 Hb 388pp) in a bilingual edition translated by James Luchte. Students of European philosophy should take a look at this. A friend was in a music shop recently and overheard someone asking for anything about Osbert Sitwell. The reply was "the only place you'll get something like that is at Abbey's". Too true.



Collocation

Did you notice the stir in the paper about a book which won the Biography category of the *Costa Book Award* and the publisher felt was not being

properly promoted in Australia? This subtle and sensitive book is The Hare with Amber Eyes by Edmund de Waal (\$39.95 354pp), a small hardback now with a colourful photographic band around the dust jacket. The paperback is due this month (\$24.95). The author is a renowned English potter who uses a very valuable collection of netsuke (little sculptures used to tie the sash of men's kimonos) to lead him on a voyage to trace his family. This family was the fabulously wealthy Ephrussi, originally grain merchants from Odessa, but later famous bankers. We watch as de



Waal imagines the life of Charles, a dandy and patron in Paris at the turn of the 19th century, and then - with the aid of letters, photographs, novels and magazines of the time - travels to Vienna to a Palais on the Ringstrasse surrounded by works of art, and ultimately to the terrible treatment of Jews in Vienna as the Second World War overtakes these good citizens. The netsuke collection is saved by their maid Anna, hidden in her apron and her mattress, until one of the daughters returns in 1945. The collection ends up displayed again in Tokyo in a vitrine owned by one of the sons, who has become a businessman in Japan and lives with his Japanese male lover. A fascinating story which has much to remind people today. Such displays of wealth are seldom seen now – more likely to be a huge motor boat!

Always generous and fair-minded, Joyce took over from her father the running of D W Thorpe Pty Ltd, publishers of book trade journals. It was Joyce who, in effect, began the printing of Australian Books in Print. Before that booksellers had to consult the various catalogues put out by publishers. Just look at what it has blossomed into - now a database combined with books from all over the world. Joyce was a Founding Member of the Women's Electoral Lobby, Sisters Publishing and the National Book Council; she has left a superb collection of books about women to the Melbourne University, along with money to maintain it. Joyce wrote around 25 books, mostly about women and children, but also about bridge and games for children. Dear, wonderful Joyce, I hope there are more like her.


