






John Buchan First published in 1915 (just before my time), this nevertheless is one of the best espionage novels ever written in my opinion. It has been made into movies

(1935, 1959, 1978, 2008), sometimes disastrously, but it is only with the whole VINTAGE CLASSICS May bookseller favourite

book that you get the real feel of the story. This novel introduces Richard Hannay and, like the four subsequent books in the series, involves a chase across open country with the life of the hero at stake ... and sometimes the life of the villain. The book moves at a rapid pace and the villain of the piece is truly dastardly. If, like me, you enjoy a thrilling chase and a baffling solution, then this is highly recommended, even if you have seen one of the movies. Peter Barry 256pp Tp \$29.95 Milan Zorec, a frustrated (to say the least) unpublished writer decides to become a sniper in the Serbian army and becomes embroiled in the siege of Sarajevo.

To say this is a somewhat unconventional novel is an understatement. Barry plays with language in a most ingenious way, constantly toying with the reader. On other occasions the book takes the reader into very dark and disturbing territory. One scene involves a nightmarish place called 'The Farmhouse' that soldiers visit for pleasure. This would easily sit beside some of the darkest moments of Cormac McCarthy's Blood Meridian (Pb \$22.99). This is the sort of literature that should be celebrated - dark, funny and challenging - a novel that will have you revisiting certain scenes not only for reasons of clarity (this novel demands your full attention), but also for its sheer wicked inventiveness. Caleb's Crossing

Geraldine Brooks

400pp Tp \$32.99 Growing up in the tiny island settlement of Great Harbour amid a small band of pioneering English Puritans, Bethia Mayfield has a restless spirit and a curious mind.

She slips the bounds of her rigid society to explore the island's glistening beaches and observe its native inhabitants. At 12, she meets Caleb, the young son of a chieftain, and the two forge a secret bond that draws each into the alien world of the other. Bethia's father is Great Harbour's minister, who feels called to convert the Wampanoag to his own strict Calvinism. He awakens the wrath of the medicine men, against whose magic he must test his faith in a high-stakes battle that may cost his life, and his very soul.

The Maid

Kimberly Cutter 304pp Pb \$29.99 It is the early part of the 15th century and the tumultuous Hundred Years War rages on. The French city of Orleans is under siege, English soldiers tear through the countryside wreaking destruction on all who cross their path, and Charles VII, the uncrowned king, has neither the strength nor the will to rally his army. And in the quiet of her parents' garden in Domremy, a 12-year-old peasant girl, Jehanne, hears a voice that will change her life - and the course of European history. The tale of Jehanne d'Arc, the saint and warrior who believed she had been chosen by God to save France, and who led an army of 10,000 soldiers against the English, has captivated our imagination for centuries.

384pp Pb \$29.99 Nothing tastes sweeter than a second chance. The Tuscan town of Montevedova is famous for its rolling green hills, long lazy lunches and

delectable cantucci biscuits. It even has its own patron saint. But Manhattan workaholic Lily Turner is not interested in any of that. She's only there to find her cheating husband. Then a mischievous six-year-old girl, full of the joys of baking, skips into Lily's world, igniting the demons of her past... and the promise of the future.

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Love in the Years of Lunacy


Mandy Sayer 320pp Tp \$32.99 A writer starts to clear out his Aunt Pearl's house. She was his father's twin sister and had lived an amazing life as a musician in fact, Pearl was an innovator



in the local jazz scene. He finds her account of the war years and a great story unfolds - of love, music and daring. Pearl, at 18, fell in love with an American serviceman, James Washington, a fabulous saxophonist who had worked with all the greats of the jazz scene and who also happens to be black, with a commanding officer who hates him for that very reason. When his request to the CO to marry Pearl is met not only with refusal, but with a transfer to New Guinea, she won't let such a thing as a war get in the way of their great love... A vivid portrayal of Sydney in wartime and an entertaining and involving story. Even the inclusion of a far-fetched episode cannot detract from the verisimilitude of this tale. *Lindy*

The Forgotten Waltz

Anne Enright 240pp Tp \$32.95 Gina Moynihan recalls the trail of lust and happenstance that brought her to fall for 'the love of her life', Sean Vallely. Enright turns her attention fully to love as she follows another flawed and unforgettable heroine on a journey of the heart.



The Moment

Douglas Kennedy

444pp Tp \$32.95 Thomas Nesbitt is a divorced American writer in the midst of a rueful middle age. Living a very private life in Maine - in touch only with his daughter



and still trying to reconcile himself to the end of a long marriage that he knew was flawed from the outset - he finds his solitude disrupted by the arrival, one wintry morning, of a box postmarked Berlin. The return address on the box - Dussmann - unsettles him completely. For it is the name of the woman with whom he had an intense love affair 26 years ago in Berlin at a time when the city was cleaved in two, and personal and political allegiances were haunted by the deep shadows of the Cold War. Kennedy has written that rare thing: a love story as morally complex as it is tragic and deeply reflective. Brilliantly gripping, it is an atmospherically dense, ethically tangled tale of romantic certainty and conflicting loyalties, all set amidst a stunningly rendered portrait of Berlin in the final dark years before The Wall came down.

Toploader

300pp Tp \$32.99 Spying inside the Embargoed Zone is an expensive business, not to say risky, and Agent Cobra wants his wages in full. But his down-at-heel spymaster can only

offer payment in kind - and the first thing he finds in an unattended storeroom. Both men are sucked into the mysterious 'Toploader' project, a race to retrieve a deadly secret from inside the world's first - and best - walled-off terrorist entity. Also caught in the crossfire are a resourceful teenage girl, a gung-ho reporter, a hapless drone pilot and at least one very unfortunate donkey. 'Toploader' is about to make their lives a lot more dangerous, and an awful lot more bizarre.

The Registrar's Manual for Detecting Forced Marriages

Sophie Hardach

416pp Hb \$29.99 Selim is a Kurdish refugee, who at a young age was smuggled into Europe in the hope of a better life.

Judged to be 13 - although how anyone knows his birth date when his mother doesn't - he has five years to persuade the authorities he shouldn't be extradited back to a country which doesn't want him, nor thinks his own country exists. Some years later, a young German woman who works in France as a town hall registrar, receives an instruction manual at the same time she suspects a young Kurdish woman is being forced to marry. She has both personal and political reasons to be worried... A really interesting novel with a lot to say about the position of the stateless, and how contemporary European society deals with them. *Lindy*

Red Dog

Louis de Bernieres Pb \$19.95 Red Dog is a West Australian, a lovable, friendly red kelpie who found widespread fame as a result of his habit of travelling all over Western Australia, hitching rides over thousands of miles, settling in places for months at a

time and adopting new families before heading off again to the next destination and another family - sometimes returning to say hello years later. While visiting Australia, de Bernieres heard the legend and decided to do some research on this extraordinary story. After meeting countless people who have known and loved Red Dog, he produced this charming tale.


King of the Badgers

Philip Hensher 300pp Tp \$32.99 After the success of **The Northern Clemency** (Pb \$27.99), Hensher brings us another slice of contemporary life, this time the peaceful civility and spiralling paranoia of a small English town.

Hanmouth, situated where the river Hand flows into the Bristol channel, is usually quiet and undisturbed. But it becomes the centre of national attention when an eight-year-old girl vanishes. This tragic event exposes the range of segregated existences in the town as spectrums of class, wealth and lifestyle are blurred in the investigation. As the search for the missing girl continues, the case is made for increased surveillance, and old notions of privacy begin to crack.

The Beauty of Humanity Movement

Camilla Gibb 320pp Pb \$27.99 Tu' is a young tour guide working in Hanoi. As he leads bands of Westerners on 'war tours' through the scarred landscape of Vietnam, he wonders what it is his



The Girl Who Would Speak for the Dead

Paul ELWORK 288pp Pb \$29.99

Emily and her twin, Michael, have just turned 13. It is the summer of 1925 and their quiet life of privilege is shaped by the loss of

their father in WWI. Émily discovers she can make unearthly knocking sounds with her ankle, and a practical joke takes on a life of its own, casting her into the role of spirit communicator. As the twins carry on their pretense, Emily has only the desire to help others in their grief and is drawn into the places of the heart, but Michael is more cynical and becomes less sympathetic towards others. A finely drawn and elegaic novel, quietly unfolding in an atmospheric setting. *Lindy*

Before I Go to Sleep

S J Watson 368pp Pb \$29.95 This is a cerebral thriller, the sort that compels you to keep reading to see how the author will handle his topic, as much as for how the story will unfold. Christine wakes up, in a strange

room next to a strange man, with no memory of how she got there. In the bathroom she sees photographs of him, labelled as her husband - and also sees that she has aged. Every day of her life she wakes up and she doesn't know where she is, what has happened or who she's with, and her husband has to remind her all over again. But when she finds that she is leaving secret notes for herself, and is keeping a journal hidden from him, the flashes of dreams and impressions she experiences throughout the day start to coalesce into a vivid and horrifying uncertainty even worse than her persistent amnesia. At times quite creepy - especially as you start to understand what is probably happening before the character does the suspense and cleverness of the narration make for a great read! Lindy

The Novel in the Viola

Natasha Solomons 400pp Hb \$29.99

Elise Landau is persuaded by her beloved parents (a celebrated singer and a controversial writer) to leave Vienna on a domestic worker's

visa to England, with the promise that as soon as they get to America they will send for her. It is 1938 and the cultured Jews of Vienna are being persecuted. But Elise, aged 18, with her fractured English, wonders if life on a country estate in Dorset, working as a parlour maid, will be any better. As war approaches, it is not only her lifestyle that has disappeared; the great traditions of English country homes are crumbling as fast as the buildings, and her relationship to the owner and his son are the harbingers of change. It is increasingly difficult to keep in contact with her family, but she holds fast to a secret - her father's last novel, hidden in an old viola. A charming read, not as quirky as Mr Rosenblum's List (Pb \$22.99), but full of loving descriptions of the countryside, a dash of romance and nostalgia for what once was. Lindy

Too Close to Home

Georgia Blain Tp \$32.99 **\$27.95** Freya and Matt and their young daughter have moved to the inner western suburbs from the eastern, where all their friends live. Freya writes plays that hover on the edge of domestic polemic,



Matt is an architect, and their circle includes artists and actors and a cross-section of trendy leftists with fine ideas and the income to afford superiority. When Shane, an old friend of Matt's, moves into the street, both what he is and what he knows forces Freya and Matt to re-evaluate their priorities. For all her lofty ideals, Freya can't cope with Shane as either an indigenous activist, or a loving but disorganised father; and the news that Matt may have fathered a child after a brief liaison 18 years previously changes his whole idea of family responsibilities. With a keen eye for the contemporary mindset matched to a talent for spare, sometimes achingly beautiful, turns of phrase, Blain gives her readers another fine novel. . Lindy

Past the Shallows

Favel Parrett 272pp Pb \$26.99 A debut novel from a young Australian writer, this will undoubtedly be compared to Tim Winton's work. Set on the bleak and hard coast of Bruny Island, Harry and Miles live with their



widowed father, a hard, bitter and violent abalone fisherman who regards his sons and the law with equal contempt. Miles is forced to help his father on his boat, because almost no-one else will work with him; Harry is terrified of the water and as the youngest, he bears the particular brunt of his father's hatred. Events take a turn for the worse when Joe, the oldest brother, escapes his father's tyranny and leaves the youngsters to deal with their father's increasingly more abusive behaviour. Devastating in its simplicity and the inevitability of the climax, this is a story that certainly stays with the reader long after the last page. *Lindy*

The Collaborator

Mirza Waheed 320pp Tp \$32.95 It is Kashmir in the early 1990s and war has finally reached the isolated village of Nowgam close to the Pakistan border. Indian soldiers appear as if from nowhere to hunt for militants on the run. Four



teenage boys, who used to spend their afternoons playing cricket or singing Bollywood ballads down by the river, have disappeared one by one, to cross into Pakistan and join the movement against the Indian army. Only one of their friends, the son of the headman, is left behind. The families in the village begin to think it's time to flee, to search for a place of greater safety. But the headman will not allow his family to leave... Waheed lights our way into the heart of a war that is all too real.

A Conspiracy of Friends

A Corduroy Mansions Novel Alexander McCall Smith

368pp Hb \$29.95 Corduroy Mansions is inhabited by a glorious assortment of characters: among them, Oedipus Snark, the first ever nasty Liberal Democrat MP, who is so detestable his



own mother, Berthea, is writing an unauthorised biography about him; and one small vegetarian dog, Freddie de la Hay, who has the ability to fasten his own seatbelt.

Good Living Street The Fortunes of my Viennese Family

Tim Bonyhady 464pp Tp \$35.00 **\$29.95** Bonyhady grew up visiting his

grandmother's and great aunt's flat in Cremorne. It was ordinary to him, but what it contained was an amazing collection of furniture, artworks, silver and household goods that had been transported from a grand apartment in Vienna - things that were without parallel because anything comparable had long been lost or dispersed. He knew next to nothing of his relatives' lives and only the death of his mother spurred him on to discover the stories of his great-grandmother, grandmother and mother, from fin-de-siecle Vienna to suburban Australia. A fabulous and fascinating read, full of colour and the sort of detail that proves life to be stranger than fiction! *Lindy*

Between the Leaves Stories of Australian Women, Writing and Gardens Katie Holmes



304pp Tp \$34.95 This is an intimate exploration of the lives of nine 20th century

women including Judith Wright, Katharine Susannah Prichard, Winifred Stephensen and Jean Galbraith, who wrote about their gardens in their letters and diaries. Holmes provides a moving insight into these women's lives, seeking to understand the ways women were involved in transforming the Australian landscape and creating within it places they called home. The writings are rich, diverse, eloquent and surprising, conveying a powerful sense of the importance of the garden and the writing of it. The collection reveals stories of grief, hope, friendship, separation, family, ageing, creativity, identity and the value of tending new growth and the question of how we live in a changing climate.

The Man Who Broke into Auschwitz

Denis Avey with Rob Broomby 272pp Tp \$35.00

In the summer of 1944, Denis Avey was being held in a POW labour camp, E715, near Auschwitz III. He had heard

of the brutality meted out to the prisoners there and was determined to witness what he could. He hatched a plan to swap places with a Jewish inmate and smuggled himself into that sector of the camp. He spent the night there on two occasions and experienced the cruelty of a place where slave workers had been sentenced to death through labour. Astonishingly, he survived to witness the aftermath of the Death March where thousands of prisoners were murdered by the Nazis as the Soviet Army advanced. After his own long trek right across central Europe, he was repatriated to Britain. For decades, he couldn't bring himself to revisit the past that haunted his dreams, but now he feels able to tell the full story - a tale as gripping as it is moving - which offers us a unique insight into the mind of an ordinary man of extraordinary courage.

Phillip Adams The Ideas Man A Life Revealed Philip Luker

310pp Tp \$34.99 **\$29.99** His velvety voice reaches over 300,000 Australian listeners

each week on ABC Radio's *Late Night Live.* Former advertising guru, journalist, passionate Labor Party member and melancholic enigma: who is Phillip Adams? Journalist Philip Luker has written the first biography of the broadcaster with his cooperation and the result is an insightful, surprising and revealing portrait of the popular cultural commentator and conversationalist extraordinaire.

An Eye for Eternity The Life of Manning Clark Mark McKenna

800pp Hb \$54.99

Manning Clark was a complex, demanding and brilliant man. McKenna's compelling biography of this giant of Australia's cultural




landscape is informed by his reading of Clark's extensive private letters, journals and diaries. This book paints a sweeping portrait of the man who gave Australians the signature account of their own history. It tells of his friendships with Patrick White and Sidney Nolan. It details an urgent and dynamic marriage, ripped apart at times by Clark's constant need for extramarital romantic love. A son who wrote letters to his dead parents. A historian who placed narrative ahead of facts. A controversial public figure who marked slights and criticisms with deeply held grudges. Yet to understand Clark's life is to understand 20th century Australia. Clark incessantly documented his life - leaving notes to the biographers he knew would pursue his story. He had a deep need to be remembered and this book means he will indeed be understood in an unforgettable way.

Beautiful Thing Portrait of a Bombay Bar Dancer Sonia Faleiro

224pp Pb \$29.95 When Sonia Faleiro set out to report on Bombay's bar dancers, she thought she knew what she

would find: downtrodden, voiceless women, the helpless victims of predictable poverty. Instead she meets Leela: 19, charismatic and fearlessly outspoken, she has been dancing in Bombay's bars since she was 13. With her sharp wit and stubborn optimism, she is the highest paid dancer in a bar on the notorious Mira Road, where she dances to Bollywood film music. In the audience are 'kustomers', men with a little disposable income, but not much else going for them. Leela has a 'husband' (who is already married), a few lovers whose names she can't remember, and an insufferable mother camping out in her flat. But when an ambitious politician shuts down the city's bars, she is forced into the most precarious kind of sex work and must trade her proud independence for mere survival. This is the vivid, intimate portrait of a young woman fleeing abuse and poverty to build a life on her own terms in a city equally bent on reinventing itself.



Reading My Father

Alexandra Styron 304pp Hb \$35.00

Bill Styron's writing and his depression dominated the Styron family landscape. Alexandra, the youngest of four children and the one who spent the most time alone with her



father, learned to navigate his storms to survive. She describes a man plagued by demons and not averse to imposing them on a young daughter. Part biography, part memoir, part elegy, this book tells the story of a daughter at last coming to know her father. From Styron's Tidewater Virginia youth and precocious literary debut to the triumphs of his best known books and on through his devastating spiral into madness, it chronicles the epic sweep of an American artist's life.

Songs of Blood and Sword

Fatima Bhutto

496pp Pb \$24.95 In September 1996, 14-year-old Fatima Bhutto hid in a windowless dressing room, shielding her baby brother, while shots rang out in the streets outside the family home in Karachi. This was the evening that her father Murtaza



was murdered, along with six of his associates. In December 2007, Benazir Bhutto, Fatima's aunt and the woman she had publically accused of ordering Murtaza's murder, was assassinated in Rawalpindi. It was the latest in a long line of tragedies for one of the world's best known political dynasties. This book tells the story of a family of rich feudal landlords - the proud descendants of a warrior caste - who became powerbrokers in the newly created state of Pakistan. It is an epic tale full of the romance and legend of feudal life, the glamour and licence of the international political elite and ultimately the tragedy of four generations of a family defined by a political idealism that would destroy them.

An Unquenchable Thirst

Following Mother Teresa in Search of an Authentic Life Mary Johnson

592ppp 1p \$35.00 This is the story of Mary Johnson's 20 years as a Missionary of Charity working for



Mother Teresa in service to the world's poor. It is a fascinating depiction of the daily struggle to live a life of religious service. At 17, she experienced her calling when she saw a photo of Mother Teresa on the cover of Time magazine, and 18 months later found herself in religious training in a South Bronx convent. Not without difficulty, this boisterous, independent-minded teenager eventually adapted to the Sisters' austere life of poverty and devotion, but beneath the white-and-blue sari beat the heart of an ordinary young woman who faced the simple and profound struggles we all share each day, the same desires for love and connection and meaning and identity. After 20 years, Johnson left the order and has since left the Church altogether. The story of this complicated, extraordinary woman speaks to atheists and Christians alike, to anyone who has ever grappled with the mysteries and wonders of faith.





Carthage Must be Destroyed The Rise and Fall of an Ancient Civilization

Richard Miles

544pp Pb \$24.95 The story of Carthage is one of the great epics of the Ancient World. And yet, thanks to the ruthlessness and brutality of the Roman destruction of the city



under Scipio in 146 BC, we know relatively little about the city: its foundation, its expansion, its way of life, its literature and gods. Carthage has to all intents and purposes been driven to the margins of history. This is a tale of battles and empire-building, of bitter rivalry and destruction - and a great civilisation whose role in shaping European culture and history has been largely ignored.

Reprobates The Cavaliers of the English Civil War John Stubbs



and the beginnings of the Soviet Union. At the centre of all this tumult were four women of the Romanov dynasty. Marie Alexandrovna and Olga Constantinovna were born into the family, Russian Grand Duchesses at birth. Marie Feodorovna and Marie Pavlovna married into the dynasty, the former born a Princess of Denmark, the latter a Duchess of the German duchy of Mecklendburg-Schwerin. These pampered aristocratic women fought for their lives as the cataclysm of war engulfed them. In a few short years, they fell from the pinnacle of wealth and power to the depths of danger, poverty and exile.



The Country House Revealed A Secret History of the British Ancestral Home Dan Cruickshank

of the country house from the disarming Elizabethan charm of South Wraxall, the classical rigour of Kinross in Scotland, the Palladian sweep of Wentworth Woodhouse, with over 300 rooms and frontage of 600 feet, through to the ebullient vitality of Lutyens' Marshcourt, the stories of these houses tell the story of Britain. All are buildings of the greatest architectural interest, each with a fascinating human story to tell, and all remain private homes that are closed to the public. But their owners have opened their doors and allowed Cruickshank to roam the corridors and rummage in the cellars as he teases out the story of each house - who built them, the generations who lived in them, and the families who lost them. As these intriguing narratives take shape, he shows how the story of each house is inseparable from the social and economic history of Britain.

The Corpse Walker And Other True Stories of Life in China

Liao Yiwu 336pp Pb \$34.95 This is a collection of 27 extraordinary interviews that opens a window, unlike any other, into the lives of ordinary,

often outcast, Chinese men and women. Yiwu reconstructs conversations he had between 1990 and 2008 with a range of remarkable people: a professional mourner, a human trafficker, a leper, an abbot, a retired government official, a former landowner, a mortician, a feng shui master, a former Red Guard, a political prisoner, a village teacher, a blind street musician, a Falun Gong practitioner and a corpse walker. The result is an idiosyncratic, powerful and dignified portrait of a people, a time and a place we would otherwise not have known.

by animals many times their size. By flickering firelight, they drew bison, deer and mammoths on cavern walls - vibrant images that still seize our imagination after 30,000 years. They are known to archaeologists as the Cro-Magnons, but who were they? Simply put, these people were among the first anatomically modern humans. For millennia, their hunter-gatherer culture flourished in small pockets across Ice Age Europe, the distant forerunner to the civilisation we live in now. Fagan brings these early humans out of the deep freeze with his trademark mix of erudition, cuttingedge science and vivid storytelling. He reveals human society in its infancy, facing enormous environmental challenges from glaciers, predators and a rival species of humans - the Neanderthals.

Warrior Women 3,000 Years of Courage and Heroism

Robin Cross & Rosalind Miles 320pp Hb \$49.99

From earliest times, women gained access to leadership in times of conflict and proved





themselves equal to the challenge of commanding during war. Women leaders abounded in the ancient world from Ireland to Israel, sometimes through the accident of birth, but often rising to power through naked opportunism and raw courage in the ranks - and it is no accident that women war leaders, like men, are often famous for their strong sexual drive. Wherever there is war, there has often been a woman at the helm. Later ages frequently wrote these women out of history, but their stories have refused to die. From the legendary Penthesilea, the Amazon gueen who fought the greatest of Greek heroes, Achilles, to the Iron Ladies of today - women of both West and East who directed military campaigns and led their countries in war.

A History of East Asia From the Origins of

Civilisation to the Twenty-First Century Charles Holcombe

456pp Pb \$49.95 Holcombe begins this ambitious book by asking the question "What is East Asia?" In the modern age, many of the



features that have characterised the region - now defined as including China, Japan and Korea - have been submerged by the effects of revolution, politics or globalisation. Yet as an ancient civilisation, the region had both an historical and cultural coherence. It shared a Confucian heritage, some common approaches to Buddhism, a writing system that is deeply imbued with ideas and meaning, and many political and institutional traditions. This shared past and the interconnections among three distinct, yet related, societies are at the heart of this book, which traces the story of East Asia from the dawn of history to the 21st century.

Library of Dreams **Treasures from the National Library of** Australia

celebrates a diverse selection of treasures from the rich and varied collections of the National Library. It examines over 50 of the most popular items, including: James Cook's Endeavour journal; William Bligh's notebook and list of mutineers; the only surviving Australian convict uniform; the original manuscript of Waltzing Matilda; William John Wills' diary; Jørn Utzon's models for the design of the Sydney Opera House and manuscripts from the trial of Lindy Chamberlain. It inspires us to take a closer look at what libraries reveal about our heritage

Anzac and Empire **George Foster Pearce** and the Foundations of **Australian Defence**

John Connor 252pp Hb \$59.95 Pearce was Defence Minister when Australian soldiers landed at Gallipoli on the first Anzac Day. Before WWI, the carpenter

who became a minister at the age of 38 had played the central role in creating the defence institutions of the new Commonwealth. He established the Royal Australian Navy and the Royal Military College, Duntroon, the Australian Flying Corps, as well as rifle and uniform factories. During the war, he oversaw the creation of the Australian Imperial Force and its deployment to Gallipoli, Palestine and the Western Front. This is a study of Pearce's part in a crucial period of Australian history.

Armies of Empire The 9th Australian and **50th British Divisions** in Battle 1939-1945

Allan Converse

368pp Hb \$59.95 This book uniquely reflects upon the experience of two divisions

from different armies facing similar challenges in WWII. The 9th Australian Division and the British 50th (Northumbrian) Division both saw long service and suffered heavy casualties, and both encountered morale, discipline and battlefield effectiveness problems. This illuminating study questions the popular mythology surrounding the Australian Digger and the British Tommy, showing how it was a combination of leadership, loyalty and tactics, rather than intrinsic national qualities, which resulted in victory for Churchill's armies.

A Little History of the Australian Labor Party

Nick Dyrenfurth & Frank Bongiorno 224pp Pb \$24.95 The Australian Labor Party is one of the oldest labour parties and was the first in the world to form

a government. 2011 marks its 120th birthday. This short and lively book tells the story of the ALP's numerous successes in winning government at all levels and making policy that has transformed lives. It also shows how the ALP has attracted an extraordinary range of members, parliamentary representatives, leaders, unionists, activists and opponents.

Dot.Bomb Australia How We Wrangled. **Conned and Argie-Bargied Our Way into the New Digital Universe**

Kate Askew 336pp Tp \$35.00 Google became a verb, countries waged war games in the new

digital universe and WikiLeaks sent shockwaves through a superpower. We got to this point from a place that was called the "dot.com bubble". Few booms in Australia have been faster or more furious than this bubble. The brightest and best investors dived in, technology geeks grew into overnight millionaires and miners stopped digging dirt and started surfing the net. The market surged and crashed, as the dot.com bubble became the dot.com bomb. Looking back, we learn that while the internet promised to level the business playing field, it has in fact done the opposite, as the market dominance of Google, Apple and Facebook attest.

52 Suburbs A Search for Beauty in the Burbs

When Hawson realised she was a stranger in her own city, she set herself a mission - to explore and photograph one new Sydney suburb a week for a year. Originally presented as a weekly blog that developed a strong following, this book reveals the Sydney beyond the postcard clichés of the harbour and beaches - places most tourists would never think to explore. Inspirational, adventurous and eyeopening, it captures the beauty of the 'burbs' - the vibrancy, multiculturalism and community - in a refreshingly unconventional way.

The Protectors A Journey Through Whitefella Past

Stephen Gray 240pp Tp \$29.99 Winner of the Iremonger Award for Writing on Public Issues, this is a beautifully written exploration of a little understood aspect of

Australian history, as well as a personal discovery of the men who were the Northern Territory's 'Protectors' of Aboriginal welfare. It deals with the moral and ethical issues of 'good intentions', guilt, racism and their consequences on the lives of Aboriginal people. While Gray uncovers this history and reveals the personalities of the 'Protectors', the questions he asks and the moral dilemmas he raises apply as readily to the complexities of black/ white relations today as they did at the beginning of the 20th century.

both in itself and in what it stands for. Since its publication in 1611, it has been the bestselling book in the world and many believe it has had the greatest impact. It spread the Protestant faith and has also been the greatest influence on the enrichment of the English language and its literature. It has been the Bible of wars from the British Civil War in the 17th century to the American Civil War two centuries later and it has been carried into battle in innumerable conflicts since then. Its influence on social movements particularly involving women in the 19th and 20th centuries - and politics was profound. It was crucial to the growth of democracy. It was integral to the abolition of slavery and it defined attitudes to modern science, education and sex.

The Traveller's **Guide to Classical** Philosophy

John Gaskin 176pp Hb \$24.95 This is the perfect primer for anyone interested in the foundation of Western thought

and a unique companion for visitors to Greek and Roman sites. Gaskin unfolds the thinking about nature, life, death and other worlds that informed the culture and society of the classical world still visible in today's cityscapes and archaeological sites and draws out its relevance and interest for the modern reader. He associates each philosopher and his ideas with a particular tourist destination, whilst a gazetteer describes the sites and notes the people and ideas connected with them.

Examined Lives From Socrates to Nietzsche

James Miller 442pp Hb \$43.95 We all want to know how to live. But before the good life was reduced to 10 easy steps or a

prescription from the doctor, philosophers offered arresting answers to the most fundamental questions

about who we are and what makes for a life worth living. Socrates spent his life examining himself and the assumptions of others. His most famous student, Plato, risked his reputation to tutor a tyrant. Diogenes carried a bright lamp in broad daylight and announced he was looking for a man. Aristotle's alliance with Alexander the Great presaged Seneca's complex role in the court of the Roman Emperor Nero. Augustine discovered God within himself. Montaigne and Descartes struggled to explore their deepest convictions in eras of murderous religious warfare. Emerson successfully preached a gospel of self-reliance for the new American nation. And Nietzsche tried bringing together what is fragment and riddle and dreadful chance in man, before he lapsed into catatonic madness. With a flair for paradox and rich anecdote, Miller confirms the continuing relevance of philosophy today - and explores the most urgent questions about what it means to live a good life.







question. Vernon was an Anglican priest, but left the priesthood a convicted atheist, and now finds himself to be a committed, searching agnostic. Part personal story, part spiritual search, this journey through physics and philosophy concludes that the contemporary lust for certainty is demeaning our humanity. We live in a time of spiritual crisis, but the key to wisdom - as Socrates, the great theologians and the best scientists know - is embracing the limits of our knowledge. This much expanded edition was previously published as After Atheism (Pb \$31) and includes new chapters looking at mindfulness meditation, pic'n'mix religion, quantum spirituality, the probability of God and why Stephen Hawking is wrong about nothing.

Here you'll meet iron that rains from the heavens and noble gases that light the way to vice. You'll learn how lead can tell your future, while zinc may one day line your coffin. You'll discover what connects the bones in your body with the Whitehouse in Washington, the glow of a streetlamp with the salt on your dinner table. From ancient civilisations to contemporary culture, from the oxygen of publicity to the phosphorus in your pee, the elements are near and far and all around us.

Deep Future The Next 100,000 Years of Life on Earth

Curt Stager 302pp Tp \$32.95 Most of us have accepted that our planet is warming and that we've played the key role in causing climate change.

Yet few of us realise the magnitude of what has happened. The course we take will affect our civilisation and the planet for millennia. What will that world look like? Stager draws on the planet's geological history to provide a view of where we may be headed. That future is far different from anything anyone has ever seen before. In the long run, the greatest threat to humans will not be global warming, but global cooling. Just when that 'climate whiplash' happens is entirely up to us. We have already put off the next Ice Age, but whether our descendants will see an ice-free Arctic, miles of submerged coasts or an acidified ocean still remains to be decided. This offers a new perspective that will change the way climate sceptics, activists and everyone in between thinks about what we are doing to our planet.

Climate Change Denial

Heads in the Sand

Haydn Washington & John Cook 224pp Pb \$34.95 This book shows how we can break through denial, accept reality and thus solve the climate crisis. It examines the nature of climate change denial, its history, how we let

denial prosper and how we can roll back denial. It summarises the climate science and explains uncertainty and probability. It also explains the social science behind denial. It contains a detailed examination of the main climate change denial arguments, from attacks on the integrity of scientists to impossible expectations of proof and certainty to the cherry picking of data. Climate change can be solved, but only when we cease to deny that it exists.

The Little Book of Unscientific **Propositions**, **Theories & Things**

Surendra Verma

224pp Pb \$19.95 Following on from his immensely popular The Little Book of Scientific Principles, Theories & Things (Pb \$19.95), Verma now takes a look at all things unscientific: simple, witty and entertaining introductions to 100 intriguing, but improbable, ideas from the borderlands of science. Is the Bermuda Triangle a genuine concern to ships? Can evolution explain psychology? Will we ever have teleportation to instantly travel from Point A to B? Will the world end in 2012? And what of all those aliens, UFOs and crop circles? This book looks at all of these questions and more, and shows how, while science may not have all of the answers, neither does The X-Files. Entertaining, sceptical, with just a touch of sarcasm, this book is a refreshing middle ground between conspiracy theories and straight-down-the-line science.

The Big Questions **Mathematics**

Tony Crilly & Simon Blackburn 208pp Hb \$29.99 This series is designed to let renowned experts address the 20 most fundamental and frequently asked questions of a major branch of science

or philosophy. This book answers the 20 key questions: What is maths for? Where do numbers come from? Why are primes the atoms of maths? What are the strangest numbers? Are imaginary numbers real? How big is infinity? Where do parallel lines meet? What is the maths of the universe? Are statistics lies? Can maths guarantee riches? Is there a formula for everything? Why are three dimensions not enough? Can a butterfly's wings really cause a hurricane? Can we create an unbreakable code? Is maths beauty? Can maths predict the future? What shape is the universe? What is symmetry? Is maths true? Is there anything left to solve?

336pp Tp \$34.95 Plastic built the modern world. Where would we be without bike helmets, toothbrushes, baby bottles and pacemakers? But a century into our love affair with plastic, we're starting

to realise it's not such a healthy relationship. Plastics draw on dwindling fossil fuels, leach harmful chemicals, litter landscapes and destroy marine life. As this engaging and eye-opening book explains, we're nearing a crisis point. We've produced as much plastic in the past decade as we did in the entire 20th century. 608pp Hb \$49.95 Virtually all human societies were once organised tribally, yet over time most of them developed new political institutions which included a central state that could keep the peace and uniform laws that applied to all citizens.

Some went on to create governments that were accountable to their constituents. We take these institutions for granted, but they are absent or are unable to perform in many of today's developing countries, with often disastrous consequences for the rest of the world. Professor Fukuyama, author of the bestselling The End of History and the Last Man (Pb \$35), provides a sweeping account of how today's basic political institutions developed. He begins with politics among our primate ancestors and follows the story through the emergence of tribal societies, the growth of the first modern state in China, the beginning of the rule of law in India and the Middle East, and the development of political accountability in Europe up until the eve of the French Revolution.

The Eichmann Trial

Deborah Lipstadt

237pp Hb \$39.95 The capture of SS Lieutenant Colonel Adolf Eichmann by Israeli agents in Argentina in May 1960 and his subsequent trial in Jerusalem by an Israeli court

electrified the world. The public debate it sparked on where, how and by whom Nazi war criminals should be brought to justice, and the international media coverage of the trial itself, was a watershed moment in how the civilised world in general and Holocaust survivors in particular found the means to deal with the legacy of genocide on a scale that had never been seen before. Lipstadt gives us an overview of the trial and analyses the dramatic effect that the survivors' courtroom testimony had on a world that had until then regularly commemorated the Holocaust, but never fully understood what the millions who died and the hundreds of thousands who managed to survive had actually experienced.

Julia Cooke & Marjorie Crosby-Fairall 24pp Hb \$26.99 Sometimes being small means you miss the things others


see; but it works the other way

Ra and the Creation, Isis and the Cobra, Seth the Evil One, Horus the Avenger, Zozer and his pyramid, Hatshepsut, Thutmose, Tutankhamen, Cleopatra are all here. Told in Williams' trademark graphic style, with plenty of captions and a separate narration along the bottom of the pages, this is colourful, absorbing and entertaining. Ages 7-10

The Dead I Know

Scot Gardner 216pp Pb \$19.99 I think Gardner is one of our most interesting authors, probably underrated because he writes for older teens, but he deserves to be read widely. His Happy as Larry (Pb \$19.99) was one of the best



books in any genre I read last year. Aaron Rowe has left school and has gotten himself a job. As an apprentice funeral director. Death doesn't bother him as much as sleep does, because he keeps having the worst nightmares and wakes up in places he shouldn't. He lives in a caravan park, surrounded by violent lowlifes and no-hopers, his only relative is losing her mind, and if he doesn't sleep soon, he'll lose his own. A powerful, finely written story of a young man trying to be better than his circumstances, and eventually succeeding. Ages 15+

Where She Went

Gayle Forman 264pp Pb \$24.95 The follow-up to the very successful If I Stay (Pb \$17.95), this takes up Mia and Adam's story three years later. Mia was accepted into Julliard to pursue her cello studies and is becoming renowned in the classical



music world. But when she left Oregon, she left Adam behind and cut him out of her life altogether. Adam, understandably hurt and confused, threw his anger and grief into rock music, and he and his band have become phenomenally successful; something he thought he wanted, but which turns out to be more than he can handle. One night in New York, they meet again and he finally has the chance to ask her all those questions that have haunted him. Quite different from the first book, but all the more enjoyable because of that. Ages 14+

New enthusiasts for Egyptology, always a popular section, will like a good book from the British Museum that was revised in 2010. Who were the Pharaohs? A Guide to their Names, Reigns and Dynasties by Stephen Quirke (\$19.95 Pb 112pp incl index) explains all these things very clearly. Nice format and excellent illustrations.



In the Young History bay of Children's books you will also find a small section on Egypt, including one in the Code Quest

series called Code Quest: Hieroglyphs (\$34.99 Hb 48pp plus CD). You can test your knowledge of hieroglyphs in practice. I was going to let you know about the very many books we have in the Travel section about Egypt, but I guess you won't be going to Egypt just now - try the Exhibition Tutankhamun and the Golden Age at the Melbourne Museum instead!

A long list of thirteen authors was announced for the biannual International Man Booker Award, which is for a body of work, as opposed to the annual Man Booker Award for best novel. This unlucky number was soon changed to twelve when John le Carre withdrew his name, as he makes a point of not competing for awards. (Books are not submitted for this award; they are chosen solely at the discretion of the judges). A couple of interesting names on the list are David Malouf, Rohinton Mistry, Phillip Pullman and Anne Tyler. Especially nice to see Anne Tyler in this company.

The very best news in late March was the announcement that gifted Australian writer and illustrator Shaun Tan was awarded the Astrid Lindgren Memorial Prize, worth about \$750,000. Great news and due recognition for his sympathetic, unusual stories. I especially like The Arrival (\$39.99 Hb 128pp), which observes a family leaving one place in order to find their future in another, strange place, and The Lost Thing (\$17.99 Pb 32pp), which is about a very strange object found at the beach one day by a boy who takes it home for a while and then finds a new place for "lost things". Another is Tales from Outer Suburbia (\$35 Hb 96pp), which contains some surreal stories such as The Water Buffalo at the End of Our Street. One of the stories, Eric, about an overseas student who comes to stay, is so delightful that it has also been produced in a small hardback format for only \$9.99. In true Shaun Tan fashion, Eric looks rather like an autumn leaf. The Lost Thing was also made into a short film (DVD \$29.95), which won an Oscar this year for Best Short Animation. I think you will get extra enjoyment from the film if you also have the book because there are so many fascinating background details in all of Shaun Tan's work. He has also provided illustrations for books by other famous Australians, such as John Marsden's The Rabbits (\$28.99 Hb, \$17.99 Pb 42pp) and Gary Crew's

Memorial (\$16.99 Pb 32pp). Another beautiful story is The Red Tree (\$17.99 Pb 32pp), about a child who wakens to find blackened leaves falling from the ceiling of her bedroom, threatening to overwhelm her.

There are some bestselling books which I seem to leave off my own reading list. I was a long time coming to Tim Winton's epic Cloudstreet (\$26.95 Pb 444pp), but when I finally did, I thought it was marvellous. Hundreds of people have also marvelled at the stage show, about two country families making their way in the city. I hear it has been made into a fantastic TV series, but unfortunately will only be broadcast on Showcase TV. I guess those of us without pay TV will just have to wait for the DVD. Meanwhile make sure you read it it's a big fat book, so you may need time.

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The other book I neglected is Anh Do's The Happiest Refugee (\$32.99 Pb 231pp). This recently won the Independent Booksellers' Best Book of the Year and rightly so. If you're feeling a bit down, read this memoir! Such a cheerful book, so full of good times and bad, so frank, and full of love. As a toddler, Anh Do came by rickety boat from Vietnam to Australia, and as a young man he gave away the chance to become a lawyer, choosing instead the risky career of comedian. (On the other hand, he was told most comedians only work four hours a week!)

Did you manage to see the film Inside Job, about the Global Financial Crisis? It was good to see certain people squirming while being interviewed, but not so good seeing certain guilty people appointed to the administration! It reminded me that Economics is a subject we should not ignore. Here are a few popular titles: Niall Ferguson's The Ascent of Money: A Financial History of the World (\$26.95 Pb 448pp), which certainly shows that money makes the world go around; Alan Beattie's False Economy: A Surprising Economic History of the World (\$26.95 Pb), a provocative examination of the economic destiny of various countries. Will they be rich or poor? And how

will their culture do? From our local economics columnist, Ross Gittins, you can choose Gittens' Guide to Economics (\$22.95 Pb) or Gittinomics: Living the Good Life without Money, Stress, Overwork and Joyless Cons (\$26.95 Pb). What more can I say? Or David Orrell's Economyths: Ten Ways that Economics Gets It Wrong (\$32.99 Pb 256pp) in which he argues how maths, psychology and environmentalism are helping reshape economics. Or How Australia Compares (\$39.95 Pb) by Rodney Tiffen & Ross



Gittins, who chart trends over several decades in seventeen developed countries for factors such as international trade and internet usage. Doublepage spreads make comparison easier. Finally Bernanke's Test: Ben Bernanke and Alan Greenspan and the Drama of the Central Banker (\$35 Pb 300pp), updated for the Pb edition in mid-2010, which discusses the tests created for Bernanke, largely by his predecessor Alan Greenspan.

Here's another beautiful book published by the National Library that I'm sure collectors will want. It is Roslyn Russell's The Business of Nature: John Gould and Australia (\$49.95 Hb 228pp), a biography of the famous taxidermist who, like many other Victorian gentlemen, decided there was good business to be had in the fashion for natural history as the world expanded. Fortunately his wife Elizabeth was a better artist than him and was willing to travel half the world to Tasmania with him. You



may not have Gould's Birds of Australia in your library, but you can have this instead, with its wonderful natural history illustrations and delicate watercolours. If you click on the Google link for this title on our website you can read an extensive extract. A great price too!

Have you read some of the detective novels of Elmore Leonard? I think there are more than forty! His snappy, amusing dialogue is one of the hallmarks of his clever plots, taken from current society. His latest spot-on plot is called Djibouti: A Middle East Western on Water (\$32.99 Pb 279pp), about a documentary film-maker, Dara Barr, and her 6ft 6in black American assistant, who are caught up in terrorist activities while making a film about the Somali pirates



in the Horn of Africa. Plenty of room for great characters and a big bang for sure! Very amusing, despite the scenario.

There is usually something interesting to be found in Young Non-Fiction. Two good suggestions: How to Talk to Boys by Dianne Todaro (\$19.99 Pb 180pp) and How to Talk to Girls by Jonathan Toussaint (both \$19.99 Pb 180pp). Agonising or exciting? These excellent books give good simple advice and include uncut comments made by boys and girls. Good idea.

I found a unique and lovely new book in Poetry. This is Waiting for the Owl: Poems and Songs from Ancient China by Ian Johnston (\$29.95 Pb 84pp). Johnston is a retired neurosurgeon living in Cloudy Bay on Bruny Island, who has made an intense study of Chinese poetry and is, himself, a noted poet. The book shows the original Chinese characters for each poem, as well as Chinese Ink Brush Paintings by Susan Collis.

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
