Soon, a nightmare of desperation, broken trust and grisly murder stretches her across the borders separating serenity and chaos, love and abandonment, and plunges her into a world of violence and evil far worse than anything she has ever known. The Graft 679pp Pb 18.95 This is the story of Nick Leary devoted father, loyal friend and shrewd businessman - and what happens when a masked intruder breaks into his home... In her unique style, Martina Cole holds up a mirror to our society, writing about tough and often harrowing subjects in a brutally honest and compassionate way. Her characters are injected with sympathy and warmth and there is an honesty in her books that speaks to millions of people. (British)

When a masked visitor enters the 4WD where computer programmer Dex and his boss are camped out, Dex's tiny oasis in the middle of the weird and unnerving festival scene is shattered in a moment of blinding violence. Black Wind 527pp Tp 29.95 A Dirk Pitt novel. In the waning days of WW2, the Japanese tried a last desperate measure - a kind of kamikaze mission, this one carried out by two submarines bound for the USA with a cargo of biological virus. Neither sub made it to the target, but that does not mean they were lost... (American)



Polar Shift 433pp Tp 29.95 A Kurt Austin adventure. 60 years ago, an eccentric Hungarian genius discovered how to artificially create a polar shift, but then his work disappeared. Now the charismatic leader of an anti-globalisation group plans to use it to give the world a jolt. Only thing is, it cannot be reversed. Enter NUMA. (American)

This Old Souse 358pp Pb 16.95

ABedand Breakfast mystery. A nostalgic trip back to Renie's neighbourhood revs up the snooping engine of **B&B** hostess Judith McMonigle Flynn. The rarely heard occupants of the supposedly abandoned house, Dick



and Jane Bland, pay their dairy bills by putting cash in the milk box - a curious thing to be sure, but certainly nothing sinister. At least, not until Judith goes from being suspicious to being a suspect, when she opens the trunk of her car and discovers a dead body which, when alive, was tightly wrapped up in this Bland business. Night Fall 581pp Pb 19.95 A John Corey thriller. Five years after the crash of TWA Flight 800, the government has declared it a result of mechanical failure. But John Corey, an ex-NYPD detective who is now a contract agent with the Federal Anti-Terrorist Task Force, is persuaded by Kate Mayfield, his wife and task force partner, that the case deserves a second look. The hunt will lead to a conspiracy at the highest levels and a race toward an elusive and lethal truth that could be even more horrifying than the original crash, one with unimaginable consequences for America. And when, after her collapse, he is finally able to question her, this feeling increases. (British)

Sick as a Parrot 327pp Pb 19.95 Adopted at birth, Hannah Conti is determined to trace her family, but she didn't bargain for a mother convicted of murder. Hannah is convinced that her mother is innocent and hires Grace Smith to prove it. As Grace investigates, she is obstructed by a lot of people who would rather she stopped digging. As if this wasn't enough, she has been conned into bird-sitting a psychotic parrot... (British)

Justice Served 325pp Pb 16.95 There is a killer terrorising the streets of Portland, brutally beating men to death. Each victim was recently on trial for domestic abuse, but each was released. With the press having a field day, it is up to DS Ray Barkley and his partner Nina Preston to stop the killer. Among the suspects is Criminal Court Judge Carole Cranston, who presided over the trials of each victim. Ray sees signs pointing toward Carole as the killer but he also begins to realise he might no longer be objective where she is concerned. But neither is Nina. (American)

When the Devil Holds the Candle 360pp Pb 360pp Pb 21.95

An Inspector Sejer mystery. Teenage troublemakers, Zipp and Andreas, unwittingly commit murder when they accidentally kill a baby in the course of a petty crime. Unaware, the pair move on to their next crime. Having followed an elderly lady home, Andreas enters her house armed, as always, with his trusty knife. Zipp waits outside, but his friend never reappears. He will never see him alive again. Fossum toys with the roles of victim and killer, and pens the inner monologue of her characters to chilling effect. It is the mental processes behind the sinister act that form the real pieces to this puzzle, and they fall gradually into place. We are forced to question the familiar stereotype - that it is always bad people who do bad things. While the reader may be party to the truth of this crime, the police remain flummoxed. There is no reason for Inspector Sejer to see a connection between the infant's death and disappearance of troublemaker. The police must wait for the evidence to present itself before they can begin to comprehend the unsettling nature of the case on their hands. (Norwegian)





Salvation, though, comes with an invitation to join the ranks of The Last Chance, an exclusive nationwide fraternity of former cops and forensic experts who look into unsolved murders. (American)

The Murder of Julie Ramage. James Ramage was a prosperous man. Then one day his lovely wife left him forever. Six weeks later, in a fit of rage, he choked her to death on the floor of the kitchen where she had spent years looking after their family. He put her body in the boot of his car and buried her in a shallow bush grave. Several hours later, he visited a lawyer friend, got his story straight and turned himself in to be charged with her murder. At his trial, he said that, on the day he killed her, Julie had told him she found the thought of sex with him "repulsive". A Victorian court later found that Julie had contributed to her own death by provoking her husband to murder! This case is arguably the one that forced the law of provocation to be reviewed. 




