



THE NEW ANNOTATED SHERLOCK HOLMES Arthur Conan DOYLE

Edited with a Foreword and Notes by Leslie Klinger 2 volume Hb boxed set 1,300pp \$115.95

Sherlockians and more casual Holmes fans alike will delight in this comprehensive edition of the 56 original short adventures featuring the world's first private consulting detective. Modelling his efforts on W S Baring Gould's 1968 Annotated Sherlock Holmes, Klinger packs as many extras into these two volumes as a special director's cut DVD: detailed essays on subjects as diverse as the Boer War and the history of rugby, illuminating citations to early drafts of Doyle's original manuscripts and full discussions of the numerous theories developed over more than a century concerning ambiguities, contradictions and unresolved issues in the stories. Those new to such scholarship will be fascinated by the sophisticated multidisciplined approach, much of it based on close readings and historical research similar to Bible study. The synthesis of the commentaries will engage veteran Sherlockians, who will be able to compare hypotheses concerning, for example, the true identity of the king of Bohemia or Holmes's actual whereabouts during the Great Hiatus. First-time readers might want to skip Klinger's brief introductions to each tale, as they presume familiarity with the plot and often hint strongly at the solutions. I believe that the four novels will be treated in a third volume due out in 2005. A wonderful gift or just a treasure to own.

THE SUNDAY PHILOSOPHY CLUB Alexander McCALL SMITH 281pp Tp \$29.95

This is a new series from the author of The No.1 Ladies Detective Agency. Edinburgh is the genteel home to ladies who lunch, attend concerts, art exhibitions and - for this is not a showy city - do good by stealth. Ladies such as Isabel Dalhousie. But behind Edinburgh's regimented Georgian facades, its moral compasses are spinning with greed, dishonesty, lust and murderous intent. Isabel knows this. Isabel, in fact, relishes rather it. An accomplished philosopher and editor of The Review of Applied Ethics, she knows the



difference between good and bad. Which is probably why, by instinct, she is an amateur sleuth. And instinct tells her the man who tumbled to his death in front of her eyes after a concert in the Usher Hall didn't fall. He was pushed.... The Sunday Philosophy Club marks new territory, but familiar moral ground, from the author of the Mma Ramotswe series. With Isabel Dalhousie, Alexander McCall Smith introduces a new and waspish female sleuth to tackle murder, mayhem – and the mysteries of life.

Pressure Point 370pp Pb 16.95 It started as a tragic but simple murder, an old woman killed in the street for her handbag, but when police detectives Terry Nye and Rose Tafoya discover some shocking forensic evidence, they know they are in way over their heads. Dennis Cooper has been prosecuting homicides in the DA's office for years, but he has never seen a case like this one. The suspect that detectives have given him is no run-of-the-mill mugger who is determined to stop Cooper at any cost. (American)

For both Sister Fidelma and her companion, Brother Eadulf of Saxmund's Ham, the case is unique because of the emotions involved: personal the abducted baby is their son! Could someone seeking vengeance have done the deed? They have made a lot of enemies in their pursuit of justice. Fidelma and Eadulf, ignoring protests that they are too emotionally involved to undertake the investigation, set out on what proves to be one of the most dangerous cases they have ever undertaken. The 8.55 to Baghdad 401pp Hb 44.95 From Suburbia to Iraq on the Trail of Agatha Christie. This travelogue documents Eames' dream to travel from London to Baghdad by train, following the route of the old Orient Express. Interwoven through his own experience is an identical journey made by Agatha Christie in 1928, a journey that was to change her life completely and led to her spending 30 seasons on archaeological digs in the deserts of Syria and Iraq. As Eames' own journey progresses, he reveals adventurous, insightful and sympathetic observations of that exotic second existence of the world's most widely read author. (British)

Ted DRACOS Ungodly

The Passions, Torments and Murder of Atheist Madalyn Murray O'Hair. Obscene, belligerent, obsessive and brilliant, the infamous and outrageous O'Hair succeeded in becoming America's Most Hated Woman. Peter was thrown from the vehicle and lived. Rinette, strapped in her seat, died on impact. Was Rinette's death a deliberate homicide to free a controlling killer from a financially and emotionally trying marriage? (American)

Brian HANSEN

The Awful Truth 657pp Hb 39.95 The Inside Story of Crime and Sport. Brian Hansen may be best known as one of Australia's foremost sporting writers, but for many years he was a specialist crime and court reporter who covered Australia's most famous cases. In this book, he makes startling disclosures on some of the nation's most bizarre unsolved crimes including: the Bogle/Chandler Mystery, the recently reopened Easey Street Murders and the strange disappearance and probable murder of his newspaper librarian Julia Garciacelay. His provocative national weekly newspaper The Truth became directly involved in four cases linking it to six gruesome murders. (Australian)

Matthew HART The Irish Game

220pp Hb 48.95 A True Story of Crime and Art. In the crowded annals of art theft, no case has matched - for sheer, criminal panache the heist at Russborough House in Ireland in May 1986. The Garda knew right away that the mastermind was a seedy, rotund and brazen Dublin gangster named Martin Cahill. Yet the great plunder - including а Gainsborough, a Gova, two Rubens and Vermeer's Lady Writing a Letter with Her *Maid* - remained maddeningly at large for years. Cahill taunted the police with a string of other crimes, but in the end the paintings brought him down. (Canadian)

Chuck HUSTMYRE

Killer with a Badge 343pp Pb 16.95 *The Shocking True Story of Antoinette Frank, the Cop-Killing Cop.* In March 1995, a New Orleans police officer shot a fellow offduty cop and two innocent bystanders at

a Vietnamese restaurant. She then responded to their call for help, as though she knew nothing of what had transpired. This is the story of her rise through the corrupted ranks, her crime and her capture. (American)

Stephen KERN A Cultural History of Causality

438pp Hb 54.95

Science, Murder Novels and Systems of Thought. This pioneering work of literary criticism is the first to trace how our understanding of the causes of human behaviour has changed radically over the course of European and American cultural history since 1830. Focusing on the act of murder, as documented vividly by more than 100 novels, Kern identifies five shifts in thinking about causality; shifts toward increasing specificity, multiplicity, complexity, probability and uncertainty. (American)

Peter LANCE 1,000 Years for Revenge

538pp Tp 27.95

International Terrorism and the FBI: The Untold Story. This investigative account uncovers startling evidence of how the FBI missed dozens of opportunities to stop the events of 9/11, dating back to 1989. The author calls it "the greatest failure of intelligence since the Trojan Horse" (which probably explains the timely release of the movie *Troy*). Threading the stories of FBI Special Agent Nancy Floyd, FDNY fire marshal Ronnie Bucca and bomb-maker Ramzi Yousef, Lance uncovers the years of behind-the-scenes intrigue that put these three strangers on a collision course! (American)

The Whitechapel Murders - Solved? (1998)

A plethora of books have sought to solve the identity of the Ripper, but Plimmer, using his 31 years of experience with the West Midlands Police, takes a unique look at the methodology and resources of 1888 and compares them with modern police techniques. Taking the reader on a chilling tour of Victorian London, he asks whether one of the most elusive men in history would have been brought to justice in today's world of DNA profiling and technology? A follow-up to Plimmer's observations is forensic crime writer Patricia Cornwell's 2002 **Portrait of a Killer: Jack the Ripper Case Closed** (Pb \$19.95), which is gruesomely astonishing and unputdownable. It argues that we are witnessing the emergence of the 'Arab Other' as the pre-eminent 'folk devil' of our times and analyses a decisive moment in the history of multiculturalism in Australia. Linda ROSENCRANCE Murder at Morse's Pond

Murder at Morse's Pond 350pp Pb 16.95 Details the shocking true account of Dirk Greineder, a prominent doctor and well-respected member of the community, who led a double life filled with phone sex, internet porn and prostitutes, and was responsible for the brutal murder of his wife of 32 years. (American)

The Role of Chicago's Underworld in the Shaping of Modern America. Extensive research includes: recently released FBI files; the Chicago Crime files of entertainer Steve Allen; firstever access to the voluminous working papers of the Kefauver Committee; original interviews with the members of the Fourth Estate who pursued The Outfit for 40 years; and exclusive access to the journals written by the widow of Curley Humphries - one of the greatest political fixers and union organisers the USA has ever known. Edinburgh: Literary Lives and Landscapes 148pp Hb 32.95

Crime Chronicler Peter Milne's December choices for our front cover have in common a Scots' theme and this very readable literary criticism caught my eye as a book to complement readers of both Conan Doyle and McCall Smith. Although the latter author is not mentioned in Carroll's literary history, some may find his research fine background reading to **The Sunday Philosophy Club** since it includes a wonderful deluge of authors from Boswell and Johnson to Wilfred Owen and Siegfried Sassoon. It also gives a thorough examination of the genius inherent in what William Cobbett described as "the finest city in the kingdom" that now hosts "the biggest celebration of the written word in the world" every August. Of course, Sherlockians will be pleased to note, it has a chapter on Sir Arthur, as well as 25 black and white photos to verify the text. (British) - *Shelley*
